

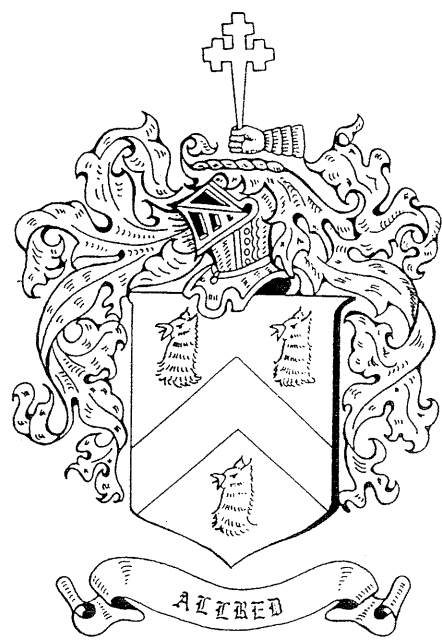

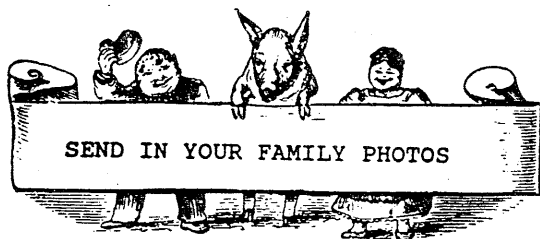

JAMES TILLMAN SANFORD ALLRED

James Tillman Sanford Allred, the son of James and Elizabeth Warren Allred, was born in Bedford Co. Tenn. March 28, 1825. The family removed to Monroe Co. Mo. In 1830 joined the Mormon Church, in 1832, moved to Clay Co., in 1835 to Caldwell Co., in 1836, and in 1839 were driven out with the Mormons to Pittsfield, Pike Co. Ill. thence to Nauvoo. He married Eliza Bridget Mainwaring Nov. 23, 1845. She was an immigrant from England, the daughter of Edward and Margater Mainwaring. She was born at Herefordshire, England. She joined the LDS Church and came to America as a young girl. She lived in the home of the Prophet Joseph Smith. She was sealed to Orson Spencer but after meeting James T.S. the prophet released her from this sealing as they never lived together.

She, as a young English girl was full of faith and courage and when her husband joined the ranks of the Mormon Battalion, she willingly went with him through the many hardships. On Feb. 7, 1846, father and two brothers started west, and on May 20th James followed with three brothers, meeting at Pisgah. At Council Bluffs, James went in the Mormon Battalion in Company A. July 16, 1846. They went to Santa Fe, from which place, he and others returned to Pueblo on detached service, and in 1847 again started west under Capt. James Brown, reaching Salt Lake City July 29, where he was discharged. He went to making Adobe's, but was called to help Sanpete. In May 1849, he was sent with ten others by President Young, to construct a bridge across the Platte River. They ferried teams across at \$4 each wagon, at the rate of 70 per day. He cleared \$1,000 and returned to Salt Lake City with an outfit of two wagons, four yoke of oxen, four cows and a heifer, with all kinds of merchandise picked up on the river, having been left by immigrants. He bought a good supply of seed wheat, which was taken to Manti in Capt. Isaac Morley's company of 30, which reached there in Nov. 1849. He also took a whip-saw and sawed lumber there and in other settlements. The first winter was severe, and he lost 9 head of stock and fed most of his seed wheat.

ON March 22, 1852 he and his father, with their families, came to Spring City being the first on the ground. He brought a log house ready to put up, and erected it the first day, covering the boards. The company consisted of



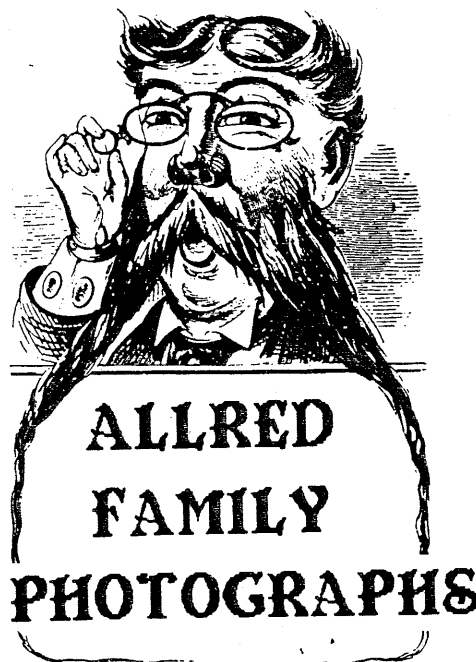

James, his wife and two children, father, his wife and son Andrew J., three grandchildren and Charles Whitlock, George M. Allred and James F. Allred with an Indian girl and boy he had bought from the Utes. Others came in the fall.

On July 29, 1853, they lost all of their stock and had to return to Manti on account of Indian troubles. In Oct. they returned to Spring City, but had to leave again Dec. 17. On Feb. 4, 1854 they went to Ephraim and helped build the fort. In May 1855 he was called to the Las Vegas Indian Mission as an interpreter, and remained two years, returning to Ephraim. In 1864 was called on an Indian Mission to Circle Valley. His wife Eliza died in Circle Valley April 20, 1866 after giving birth to a baby girl named Margaret B. On account of trouble with the Indians she was buried at sundown.

The following children went with him to Las Vegas on Mission, wife Eliza, Eliza Maria, Ellen Aurelia, Elizabeth Diantha, James Tillman Sanford Jr. Edward was born while there.

NOTE: This is the first half of the story of the great pioneer James Tillman Sanford Allred. Due to space limitations the last half will be printed in issue #4 (July). Lovina Smith Allred Robinson was the author of this history. She is the daughter of James T.S. Allred and a great grandmother to Tessie Pyper. According to Tessie she was known as a great record keeper.

May 17, 1878, m. Miles Gruner Feb. 22, 1899; Lucy Emmeline b. Aug. 6, 1880, m. William T. Stanley, Feb. 22, 1912; Cynthia Butler b. Nov. 9, 1882; John Ephraim b. Oct. 10, 1884; Clay b. Oct. 7, 1887. Family resided Spring City, Deseret and Hinckley, Utah.

Married Hannah Stoddard Barney Dec. 25, 1879. Their children: Angus; Alpin L.; Lloyd. Family home Deseret, Utah.

Ward teacher 45 years; seventy. Minute man in early Indian troubles. Made three trips across plains for immigrants. Member city council of Spring City. Worked on Manti temple. Indian war veteran. Died Nov. 27, 1910, Salt Lake City.

Dear Family,

I haven't had a more happy surprise in a long time. To have my dear friend and neighbor (who's common Allred "roots" has helped cement our relationship) hand me the #2 Allred Family N/L.

Allred as he had his volumn underway (THE ALLRED FAMILY IN AMERICA), and also the \$100 in our treasury. I felt it should be contributed toward the purpose for which it was collected.

I should like to state to all that John Gurnett Allred was one of the great men of our family. His leadership was not biased in any way. He sacrificed much, suffered greatly. I truly loved that man. I visited him in the hospital a few days before he died. What a man to be proud of.

From the articles included in this present Newsletter I take it the contributors are all from William Allred & Elizabeth Thrasher, I came through their son Isaac, then Wm. Moore, Byron H. etc.

I should have known better than to get involved in this family thing because I have for years warned those who have offered to help in these searches that you cannot become "slightly involved" in genealogy and in the things past and present. 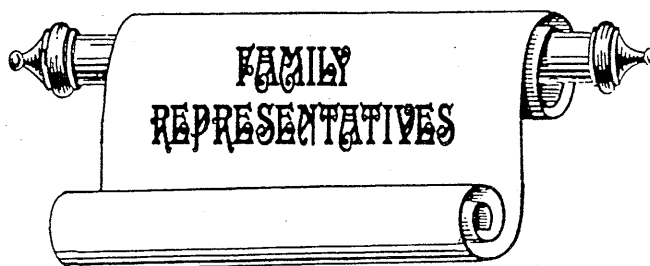

DON ALLRED'S WORK

ALLRED FAMILY ROSTER

The ALLRED FAMILY ROSTER is a project which Don Allred has been working on for over three years. Don is a computer genius and his dream is to build a family roster to include all the Allreds in America! He has devoted thousands of hours of his own time to fulfill this dream. It's not just a family roster either because most of the names are fully linked and Don can create a pedigree chart on demand for any line of the family! This is not a money making project, he is doing it for the family. The ALLRED FAMILY ROSTER is being sold for just the cost of the printing! Smaller books can be printed on just your direct family line.

Here in his own words is how he is doing.

Dear Pat,

The book is 1,262 pages and contains over 6 million bytes (characters) of information. Placed end to end the pages will reach 1,156 feet. The index has been modified again and contains not only the progenitors of the descendants but a relationship of the others as well. For example under my mother Mary E. MacDonald, it will show that she is the spouse of my father Clement Allred, helpful when you have multiple non-descendants with the same name as we do many times.

Latest stats:

Allred descendants	13,674
Spouses	5,859
Spouses fathers	1,610
Spouses mothers	1,647

Total names in the roster as of 4/7/90--22,790

I just completed the test tape from which the other printer uses to print the book. The test came out beautifully. I think we will print about 20 copies this first run. I have orders for about 15 and this will leave a few extras. The cost including shipping should be in the \$45 to \$50 range. I'll know better when I get the bills.

Now that we have the capability to print The Roster directly from magnetic tape we can go back to printing the book on demand, well sort of on demand. Now what I want to do is print a minimum of 10 copies per month. The printer gave me a price of 3 cents an impression which at 1,262 pages is \$37.86 per book. They want a minimum order of 10,000 impressions per month or 9 books per month to maintain this price. This does not include the cost of covers, binding and shipping. If we can't sell 10 copies a month we can go back to the old method of Xeroxing a master from the laser printer which takes more time and will add about \$15 to the book.

That's about all the highlights of the week.

EARLENE SMART

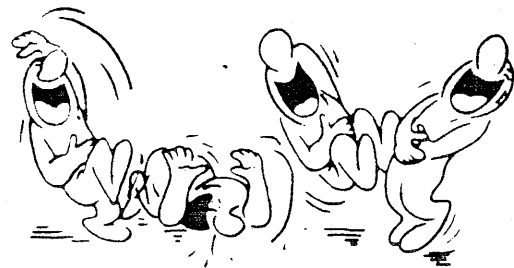

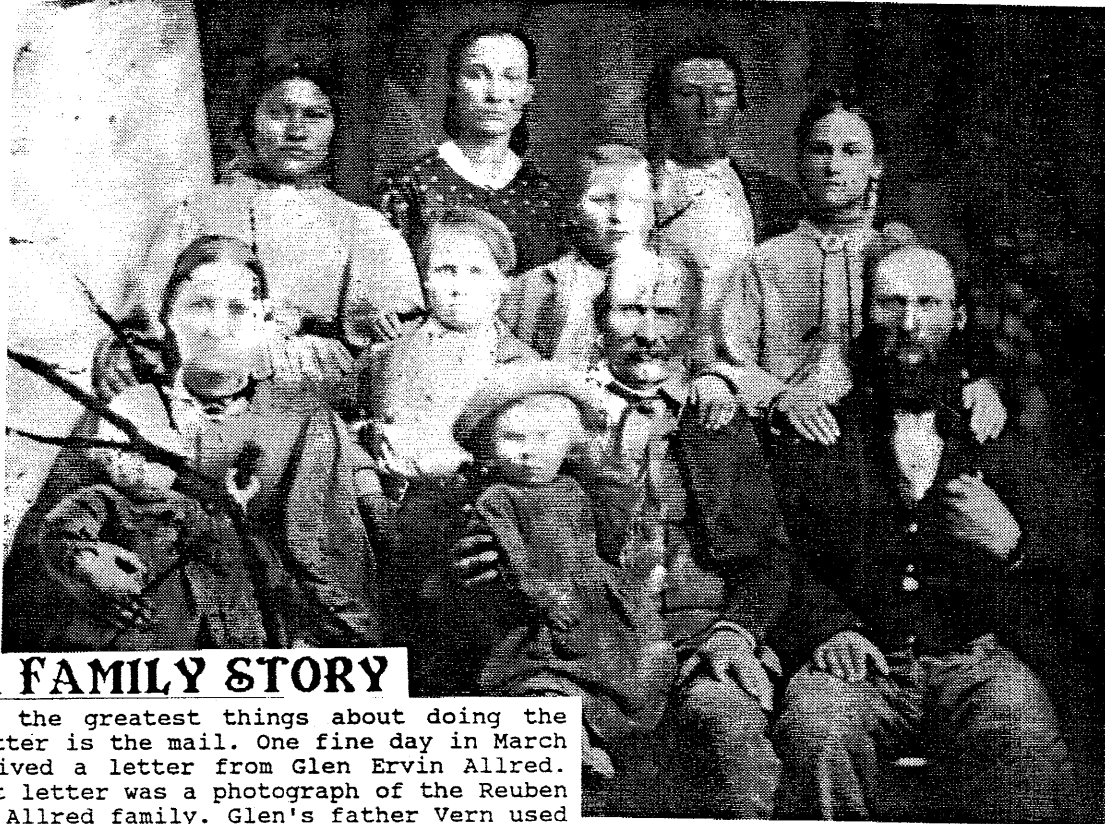

A FAMILY STORY

One of the greatest things about doing the Newsletter is the mail. One fine day in March I received a letter from Glen Ervin Allred. In that letter was a photograph of the Reuben Warren Allred family. Glen's father Vern used to say he was a double Allred.. His father came from the Isaac line and his mother from the James line. When I saw the photo I recalled a story my father used to tell me of a little indian girl named Rachel, for there she was standing in the family group.

My father had told me that a band of indians came through with little Rachel held captive. They threatened to kill her if my grandfather Reuben Warren wouldn't buy her. That was about all I knew of Rachel and I quickly wrote Glen to see if he could help fill in her story.

Much to my delight he answered, and here is what he recalls from what his father told him.

The Story of Rachel Allred

There was a band of Indians from Nevada who had been over to the Ute Indian Reservation in the Uintah Basin (abt. 1853) and were on their way back to Nevada. They had this little Indian girl with them and traded her to Reuben Warren Allred for a horse. It was not known whether they had stolen her, traded for her, or what, but it was assumed that she came from the Ute tribe. Reuben and his wife Lucy Ann, named the little girl Rachel and she was raised to adulthood with their family. She was an excellent seamstress.

Rachel married a white man named Murray from Spanish Fork and they moved to the Indian Reservation in the Uintah Basin where they raised a family and there Rachel died. She is buried on the old Daniels Ranch, near the Uintah River about two miles north of Fort Duchesne. She has many descendants in that area including Murrays, Reeds, Chapooses, etc. We, including my father, refer to them as cousins. Oh yes, this all took place near Allred Settlement (Spring City) or Ft. Ephriam (Ephriam City). Glen E. Allred

Note: After asking around for information about Rachel, I learned that at one time she saved the settlement from an Indian attack. Does anyone out there know that story? Oh yes, there is one added item: In 1959, at an Allred Reunion held in Utah, a large group of Indians came. I was there and I recall my dad going over to talk to them, he came back very excited, they were Rachel's descendents!

HOW CAN I HELP?

FINDING THE ALLREDS

We need volunteers to take a section of the country, by state, zip code, or whatever, and contact these family members. The R.C. Allred family is doing the entire state of North Carolina (about 900 names) and so far the results have been good. A copy of the cover letter and questionnaire can be obtained from Don Allred (15231 Weddington St., Van Nuys, CA. 91411). He says he will provide mailing labels also. The information obtained will be added to the Family Roster project and soon the entire Allred Family in America will be linked! Wow, it really is a gigantic project, but I know we can do it and we can pull our wonderful family together. Allred's unite!

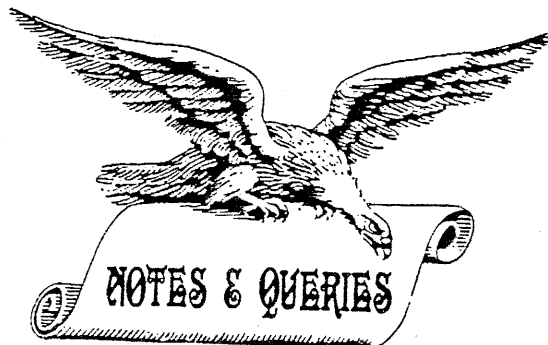
JOURNAL ENTRY OF

Byron Harvey Allred Jr.

We were hauling logs from Sprague's Canyon in 1890. The snow was very deep and we would have to wallow to our logs and break our drag roads almost every day. Uncle Seymour had never been used to hard muscular work and was a very large, bulky man, and this made it doubly hard for him to do the work, so Warren and I would always help him get his load.

One day we had been cutting a few trees that stood close together. Seymour and I had been cutting side by side. I had fallen my log so that it fell across the mountain side directly across the sharp backbone of a little ridge. It so fell on this backbone that the tree very nearly balanced, the butt being heavier and settling in the snow very near to where Uncle Seymour was cutting his tree. I left him at work and rest, walking up the tree trunk as it laid in the deep snow to avoid wallowing through it. When I reached that part of the tree directly over the sharp backbone, I left it and pushed my way through the snow up the mountain farther to where another large saw log was standing. I commenced chopping on this, and when I had it nearly ready to fall, I looked up and saw that Uncle Seymour was sitting on the butt of the large log I had previously felled. I had so cut this last tree that it would fall directly across the tip of this log he was sitting on. I shouted to him to "Look Out!" He replied that it would not hurt him. I told him it surely would and he had better clear out. He wiped his perspiring brow and contemptuously replied back, "Ah, let 'er go. I'm all right." I laughingly said, "All right, old boy, you and the tree for it." A few more well directed blows with my sharp axe brought the huge saw log crashing down right across the tip of the log on which he sat. As it struck the tip, up he shot from the butt into the air like a man thrown from a stump. His legs and arms were spraddled out like those of a jumping jack. His axe went in another direction, and when he had reached several feet high in the air, he turned down head-foremost, lighting in a very deep snow drift and went ear out of sight except his feet which could be seen protruding a tattoo above the snow.

We could not give him any help, for the reason that we had walled so hard we could not wallow through the snow to him and we felt so inclined. He finally wallowed the snow down and he could get up on his feet. And as he stood there in a snowdrift, bare-headed, it added new spasms to our fits of laughter. He was not hurt, but when he tried to sit down he was uncomfortable for some days after.

When asked to write a short story about the Tennessee Allreds, and my grandfather, I was at a loss.

I've only seen "paw", as he was called, 3 or 4 times. We lived in Kentucky, and he lived in Allred, Tennessee.

Things I do remember others talking about, was "paw" cutting Red Cedar trees and riding the logs down the river to the mill.

Paw was a very gentle, loving, good natured, mild tempered man. He had a hard life with 10 children to feed.

MY grandparents raised big gardens and did lots of canning of vegetables. They also stored fresh vegetables and fruit in the cellar. The meat was canned or hung in the Smoke House. Sauerkraut was put in big crocks and stored in the cellar. Bread was baked every day in the wood burning cook stove.

I remember the home place as a big two story, wooden sided house, with a huge front porch, with straight cane bottom chairs.

In 1947 we had a reunion. Twenty two grandchildren and all of "paw's" children except 1 was there. Paw and Maw Allred had 6 boys and 4 girls. Mayford, the oldest, then Milton, Parris, Orangie, Orbie, Lealen, Coonie, Lee, Earsley and Erie. Lee, Earsley and Erie are still living and all three are in Battle Creek Michigan area.

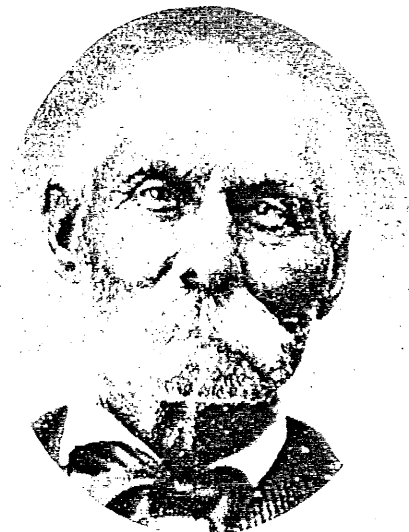
