We feel good about the research that has taken place. Our researcher Dawnell Griffin has prepared a lengthy report for submission to those who have contracted and paid for her services, i.e. the Louis E. Allred Family Organization, the Rulon C. Allred Family Organization and individuals from the other branches of the family organization who contributed.

From Dawnell's work and the efforts of many others, we have completed documentation on the following sheets: Reuben Warren Allred, James Allred, and William Allred. We have a more complete record on these families than we have ever had before and our work is fully documented with copies of actual documents. The Thomas Allred sheet is also mostly documented with the information on his children and the data on them.

We have proven direct lineage from James Allred back to John Allred/Aldred/Alred. We have also documented sheets for brothers ans sisters of these and have added additional children in some cases, marriages (which led to their families) in other cases, etc. They will soon be available to all who would like them.

We are desperatly searching for a breakthrough in finding where John Allred was before 1755. We would welcome any help.

We wish to thank all who have added their records to ours helping us get a more complete record in one place. Dr. Richard Rees in California, Pat Burnell in England at the Freinds House, Marie Smith in Randolph Co. North Carolina, Rula Campbell in Nauvoo, Illinois, and a host of others. A special thanks to Donald C. Allred for without his efforts much of this would not have been possible.



just send us a 5 cent copy so we at least can know that a photo exhist and put it in our index. Oh yes, Please identify the persons in the photos if you can and specify if you can't.





COLUMBUS "LUM""HICK" AND JAMES ANDREW JOHNSON "JUG" ALLRED

#### LUM AND JUG ALLRED

There are a couple of things about Uncle Lum and Jug that might be interesting. Uncle Lum's name was Columbus T. but he was called by all us nephews and nieces as Uncle Lum and others called him "Hick". His mother died when he was born and he did not have a name in the 1880 census. He told me one time that he named himself and that the family called him "Hick" until he got old enough to know he should have a name. He said that he lived by a man named Lummie Tosh and he just gave himself that name. I am sure it was Columbus Tosh and not just Lummie as he told it to me.

It seems that Alcholism runs in the family. Uncle Lum and Uncle Jug also were freely to use it. In fact my dad said that he guessed that was why he was called "Jug". But about 1892 Uncle Jug got in Jail in Cullman and as the story went that I heard as a child was that he was a small person and his wife was also. She visited him in jail with the baby. The jailer left them alone and they changed clothes. His wife wore a big bonnet and he put it and her dress on and carried the baby and walked out of jail. He left and was not heard of again. I used to guestion my dad about this and he would say he was probably drunk was the reason he was in jail. Then in the 1970's when I began to do research he still did not seem to know much more. I found the criminal record book in the Court House in Cullman and this is the story that I found.

Uncle Jug was visiting a Mr. and Mrs. King near Holly Pond where he lived. They lived in a one room house with only one bed. They got to drinking and finally went to bed, with Mr. and Mrs. King in the bed and Uncle Jug on the Floor on a pallet. Sometime during the night Mr. King woke up and his wife was on the pallet with Uncle Jug. When she got caught she yelled that Uncle Jug was raping her. So Mr. King swore out a warrent for Uncle Jug and he was put in jail.

I told this to dad and he said it was something like that and that Uncle Jug did not leave when he left jail but put the baby in his father's (William Allred's) wagon and then went out to Crane Hill where William had moved. He stayed in the Bluffs for about 6 months, then they loaded him in a wagon of cotton and carried him to Cullman (22 miles) and drove him to the depot. He got on a train and left and was never heard from again!



At our June Meeting a new branch of the family was represented and here is the story of how she found us.

As president of the I.W. Allred family reunion for 1990-91 I was having a hard time deciding what to do that would be meaningful and of interest to our family and the time was running out

Some time ago my sister Lorraine had said that her kid's school principle had told her about the celebration in Spring City (Allred Settlement) Utah on memorial Day. So we decided to drive down. We were disapointed to find out it all took place on Saturday not Mon.

A cold wind was blowing so we had our picnic in the cars in the church parking lot. In as much as the kids needed a restroom a group walked around the church and found a door that was unlocked. As we entered, seeing the beauty of the chapel, the need for restrooms was almost forgotten.

We recieved directions to the cemetary. The wind had died down and it was quite pleasant.

I walked out to the James Allred monument and turned around to see where my Uncle Ken was. With the aid of his cane, he was slowly taking his time among so many Allred graves. My heart was touched and I knew then what we needed to do for our reunion.

As I pondered on what to do, and where to start, the thought "Call the Utah Historical Society" popped into my head. They gave me the name of Kay Watson and from then on everything fell into place.

I want to express much thanks to Kay for all of her help, especially for sending my name to Don Allred who sent me an ALLRED FAMILY NEWSLETTER talking about an Allred Family Organization Meeting on June 23. I recieved my Newsletter just days before the meeting. Is this just a coincedence, I think not.

I have been taught about the Spirit of Elijah and read the scriptures many times, but now I know personally of it's power and promise. I also know that I must do all I can in helping the Allred descendants gather all the information and names of all the Allreds in America and I must add, in Canada, my birthplace where I have many relatives. Thanks and God Bless. Had we gone to Spring City on Saturday instead of Monday I'm sure the events would have been very different. It was supposed to be the way it was.

### SPECIAL PROJECT

We have another project which is moving right along. From the book "The Allred Immigrants and Worldwide Descendants" we have obtained 5,400 names and addresses. We are in the process of contacting EACH of these Allreds by mail. Don has developed a questionaire and a mailing list with address labels. He has divided up the country according to states and several people have volunteered to mail out these questionaires at their expense. Here is Don's report on the progress of this project.

"Sharon Jessop has completed about half of North Carolina, Jack Fuell's daughter Mona has taken on Tennessee, Arnie Allred is doing Georgia, Pat Burnell is doing Virginia, Darlinda Gorley has done South Carolina, Carrol Allred McCawley is going to do several Eastern states after the Tennessee Allred Reunion. This puts a dent in the South but we have a way to go before we have exhausted all the addresses in the public record. I had originally wanted to start in Utah but due to the research Dawnell Griffin and Earlene Smart are doing on the early Allreds, the South made more sense. Hopefully we can find someone who will volunteer to buy stamps enough to do the 834 in Utah."

We need some help in getting these questionaires out. If you are willing to help you can take a state you feel you can afford. Some states have only 20 or 30


Allreds. Each questionaire will be mailed with a self addressed stamped envelope inside, so if you take 20 names to do it will require 40 stamps. When the questionaires are returned the information will be included in the Roster.







The three trees to the right are the ones in the story. The other trees to the left, were planted the same way and at the same time, but removed over 60 years ago...

Pat asked me to tell the story of how our big trees were planted. I have been told several different versions, but everyone agrees that they were planted by soys playing with "mud sticks". Most of the lescendants of Reuben Warren Allred Sr. seem to be tware of this story.


As many of you know, my husband and I live in and own the old home in Spring City, Utah that my Great, great, grandfather Reuben Warren Allred Sr. built in 1864. Here, he and his wife Lucy Ann Butler lived and where he was living until his death in 1896. The home has been added on to, since that time, but when first built, it was a two room rock dwelling. Later on, their son, Reuben Warren Allred Jr., (my great grandfather), built a home on the same block, south of his father's where his children, (at least most of them), were born and raised. Warren England Allred, (born 1873), my grandfather, was one of them.

According to my uncle, Frank Beck Allred, (son of Warren E. Allred), his father told him how the three arge trees, on the south east section of our lawn, were lanted. He said that grandfather and other boys, (not mown), were playing with "mud sticks" and throwing nud with them. When they were called home, they tuck the sticks in a row in the mud and left them there. Sometime later, when grandfather returned to play, he ound that the sticks were growing. Many years later, ie owned that home and raised his family there.

Two years and over 100 years later, these magnificent rees were 120 ft. tall and the largest was nearly 20 ft. n circumference. Limbs were beginning to fall off and ve were afraid of them falling on our home, especially when the wind was blowing, so it became necessary to lave them trimmed to about 80 ft. Two of the trees eem to have died, but the smaller one in the middle has urvived. The "mother" tree, a Riverbottom Cottonwood, near the street, is dead too, but still, these rees stand as monuments to my grandfather and the other boys.



Note: Many thanks to Cousin Tessie for sharing this family story. Over 45 years ago a little girl in California was being a story by her father (Clement Allred) about how her grandfather (Ephriam L. Allred), when he was a little boy, was called in from play with other children, stuck his playing stick in the mud along with two others and they grew into giant trees. You can imagine my joy when I traveled to Spring City for the first time and saw those magnificant trees. I was that little girl.



#### THE LONGEST INFANTRY MARCH

The longest recorded infantry march in history of over 2000 miles, took place in 1846-1847 during the Mexican War. Four men of the Allred family, James T.S. Allred, Redick Newton Allred, James Riley Allred and Reuben Warren Allred with about 14 of their cousins and in-laws participated in this march.

During the early part of 1846, the need for men to assist the U.S. Army in the Mexican War was urgent. President James K. Polk instructed the Secretary of War to authorize Col. Stephen W. Kearney (later general), the Commander of the Army of the West, to enlist a new battalion of 500 men and increase his forces.

Captain James Allen was ordered to Council Bluffs, Iowa and to the Mormon camps to recuit five companies of 75 to 100 men each from the ranks of the Mormons.

The Mormons were destitute and looking for a way to finance and continue their journey west. Brigham Young, leader of the Mormons, urged the men to enlist in the Army, telling them it was their patriotic duty to join. Five companies totaling over 500 men were mustered in on July 16, 1846 in Council Bluffs, Iowa and were later known as the Mormon Battalion. It was reported to be the only battalion of the Army where every man could sign his own name. About 50 wives and some families were also permitted to go with the men in their own wagons as cooks and to do the laundry. Two of the wives were Mrs. James T.S. Allred and Mrs. Reuben W. Allred.

The men first marched to Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas to be outfitted. The men recieved \$32.50 for uniform allowance which they sent back to low to their destitute families and marched in their own clothes instead.

In spite of the temperatures ranging from 101 degrees in the shade to over 125 degrees in the sun, the men set out for Santa Fe, each carrying his blanket, knapsack, 36 rounds of ammunition, a canteen and flintlock musket. All the men marched on foot except the advance guard and the Colonal with five Leutenants. No one rode in the wagons except the sick. Santa Fe surrendered to Gen. Kearney in Sept. The Battalion reached Santa Fe on October 9, 1846, were ordered to continue to Tucson (then capitol of Sonora, Mexico.) with 25 wagons and ordinance of Gen. Kearney and arrived in Tucson on Dec. 16, 1846.

The Mexican War was over and they were ordered to continue on to San Diego. They arrived on Jan. 29, 1847. Under very extreem conditions and hardships they had traveled over 2000 miles in seven months!

Of the original 500 men only 350 made it all the way with the other 150 men and families being sent to Pueblo, Colorado to serve out the remainder of their one year enlistment. At their discharge, the men had to walk home. Many to Salt Lake City and many others to Iowa to be re-united with their families.

It is difficult to conceive of a harder march under more trying conditions than that made by these men during the War with Mexico. Twenty-two men paid the supreme sacrifice by giving their lives in the service of their country.

Bronze markers are placed at the gravesights of these men and wives who marched in the LONGEST INFANTRY MARCH in history.



A Baked Sale was held in the same building, and copies of the book, "Life Under the Horseshoe- A History of Spring City", could also be obtained there.

At the new City Hall on Center Street, an Arts & Crafts show was held. Paintings, quilts, hand-made furniture, jewelry, etc. all made by Spring City artists.

At 5 PM a delicious Barbacue Turkey dinner was held at the Church Park. Proceeds from the day, over \$1300.00 went to our Old Elementary School Restoration Fund. This building, built in 1899, is now owned by the Spring City D. U. P. Proceeds from the sale of the book, "Life Under the Horseshoe" also go to the Restoration Fund. Copies of this book may be obtained at the Spring City, City Hall, 150 E. Center St., Spring City, Utah 84662, or by sending a check or money order to the same address, made out to Spring City D. U. P. Cost of the book, at this time is \$16.50-add 2.25 for postage, for a total of \$18.75. The price of the book may be going up in the near future.

At least four carloads of Allreds visited our city on this day. I would have liked to have seen more, but perhaps, next year. All in all, it was a fun filled and successful day. Tessie Pyper



## LYDIA BELLE HENRIE ALLRED

I have been asked to write briefly about one of our truly great Western Pioneers. She is certainly no stranger to most of us. The ALLRED Genealogy tells us that mother, grandma, Aunt Belle, or whatever other name she might be to you, left 664 descendants. (It is probably much closer to 700).

Lydia Belle was born: 6 Jan 1881 at Manti, Utah to James Henrie and Hanna Maria Snow. They relocated to Ferron, Emery, Utah when she was just a girl. It was in Ferron that she met and later married Louis E. Allred, 18 Jun 1898. They had three girls and eleven

boys.

Life was never easy in those pioneer settlements but grandma's lot was the more difficult by being struck with "Milk Leg", brought about by poor circulation. From the birth of Ora, 1900, she suffered with chronic sores on her legs. She had a delightful sense of humor and could be characterized by the little church songs that were a part of her daily chores.

Grandma was well known throughout our communities as a very capable healer. Lavina Miles Harris, MD, our family doctor and a close personal friend, was known to have stated that in many things grandma was a better medic than she, doctor Miles, was

Grandma did her "doctoring" with herbs, teas, pouldices and remedies. We were bombarded with Wormwood tea and cow salve. Have you ever tasted Wormwood? Anything that nasty tasting would just have to be good for you! By using her own brand of nutrition, medicine and remedies, she raised 14 kids to maturity.


The last time I saw grandma was during the week before New Year. We spoke of her great age and I mused of how marvelous it was that she would soon be ninety-four. She felt it was anything but wonderful and observed that it was probably her lot that "...they will have to take a gun and shoot me on resurrection morning." She died only six weeks later.

While grandpa "Lou" met fame as a stalwart in the church, farming co-ops, school boards, irrigations co-ops, etc. grandma achieved immortality there in the kitchen as she brought fourteen kids and a few hundred grandkids to full maturity.

The parents of Eliza Bridget Mainwaring (wife of James T.S. Allred) were Edward Mainwaring and Margaret Nash. Their children were: Edward (1810), Jane (1814), Sarah (1819), Margaret (1821), Eliza Bridget (1821), Francis (1823), Ann (1825). William died as a child in England, Richard born in England and came to Utah.


James T.S. returned to Ephriam in 1866 and came to Spring City again in July 1866, built a home received some land and now has 73 acres. He served as a Major in the Black Hawk War, and was a captain of minutemen in Spring City. He was road supervisor one term, Selectman for several years. He was first counselor to the first Bishop in Ephriam and Spring City. He was also county and city surveyor for several vears. He was a heavy user of chewing tobacco. After hearing one of the Apostles talk one night he told his people he would not use tobacco anymore. He was very old but he kept his word and began to eat hardtack candy which he bought by the bucketfull. He had a little sack which he kept full of candy and placed by the bed so he could eat some at night.. He was called "Candy Grandpa". Eliza died in 1866 after giving birth to a baby girl (Margaret) because of having trouble with the Indians.

He married Margaret Mainwaring (Eliza's sister). Margaret was born Jan 20, 1821 in Herefordshire, England. She was baptized April 17, 1850 in England. She was married to a man named Roberts and emmigrated to Utah. Her husband died and she married James T.S. They lived together until her death Oct. 10, 1888 at Spring City. The Indians called J. T. S. "Shouritz" and his brother Wily Payne Allred "Shunitz".

His third wife was Fannie, an indian girl. His fourth wife was Perlina Allred. Her first husband was named Coy. James T. S. Allred died March 28, 1905 in Spring City, Utah and was loved by all who knew him.
