William Allred of Frederick County, Maryland

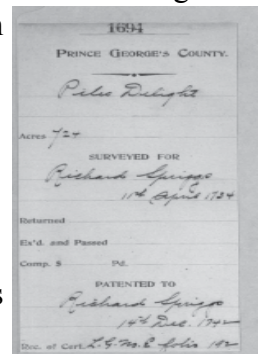
By now I feel certain you have heard the stories and seen the documentation proving the Allred family was living in central North Carolina by the mid-1700s. You have also heard the stories and seen some of the documentation proving the Allred family was living in Lancashire, England and at least one, Solomon Allred, was living in Chester County, Pennsylvania, in the 1720s. But where was the family living between the 1720s and 1750s?

In March of 1732 the proprietor of the Province of Maryland desired to attract settlers to the Northern and the Western areas of his territory, so he made a proclamation declaring special land prices and taxes for settlers.

1. Any person having a family to come to the land within three years of the proclamation and actually settle on the land could have two hundred acres without payment for 3 years. After 3 years the settler had to pay to the proprietor four shillings sterling for every hundred acres.

2. Any single person, male or female between the ages of 14 and 31 could have 100 acres under the same conditions.
3. They were to be charged taxes and the security of their land would be insured as if they were British subjects, which was quite a boon.

The Sprigg and Pile families of Maryland were wealthy, well educated, politically active, up-standing members of the community and they obviously took advantage of the free land offer. Dr. Richard Sprigg obtained a tract of land on April 11, 1734, which he named Pile's Delight in honor of his mother, Elizabeth Pile Sprigg and his maternal grandfather, Dr. Richard Pile. This land was located along the northern side of the Potomac River "about six miles above the mouth of Antietam" Creek. A few years later, Dr. Sprigg purchased an adjoining property

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known as Bedlam Green. These two parcels became a large tract of land that remained relatively pristine and undeveloped until the mid-1740s.

No doubt paying taxes on this undeveloped land played a part in Sprigg's decision to sell the property. On December 3, 1746, Sprigg sold these two tracts of land, Pile's Delight and Bedlam Green, dividing it among three men.

Joseph Robinette (also in records as Joseph Robinson) purchased a total of 150 acres (21 acres from Bedlam Green and 129 acres from Pile's Delight) which he named Robinette's Purchase. Thomas Kelley purchased a total of 125 acres (all from a portion of Pile's Delight) which he named Kelley's Purchase.

The third man, William Allred of Prince George's County, Maryland, also filed a deed for land he had purchased for 50 £ (British Pounds Sterling) from Richard Sprigg. This tract of land, a total of 125 acres, was carved from Pile's Delight (117 acres) and Bedlam Green (8 acres). Allred named his new land Allred's Purchase. [Prince George's County, Maryland, Land Records 1746-1749; page 24; published by TLC Genealogy, FHC SLC.]

William Allred's house no longer exists (that we know of). However, a house which dates back to the 1700s is in existence and sits on land very close to where Allred lived. This house is of the same style and architecture of houses built in the same area and time period as William Allred's land. His house may have looked just like this. The Mary Hill House was built in the 1780s, named after its original owner, and is open to the

The new neighbors, Thomas Kelley, Joseph Robinette/Robinson and William Allred apparently did not "get along." A few years after they became neighbors, they were in Court suing each other over various complaints.

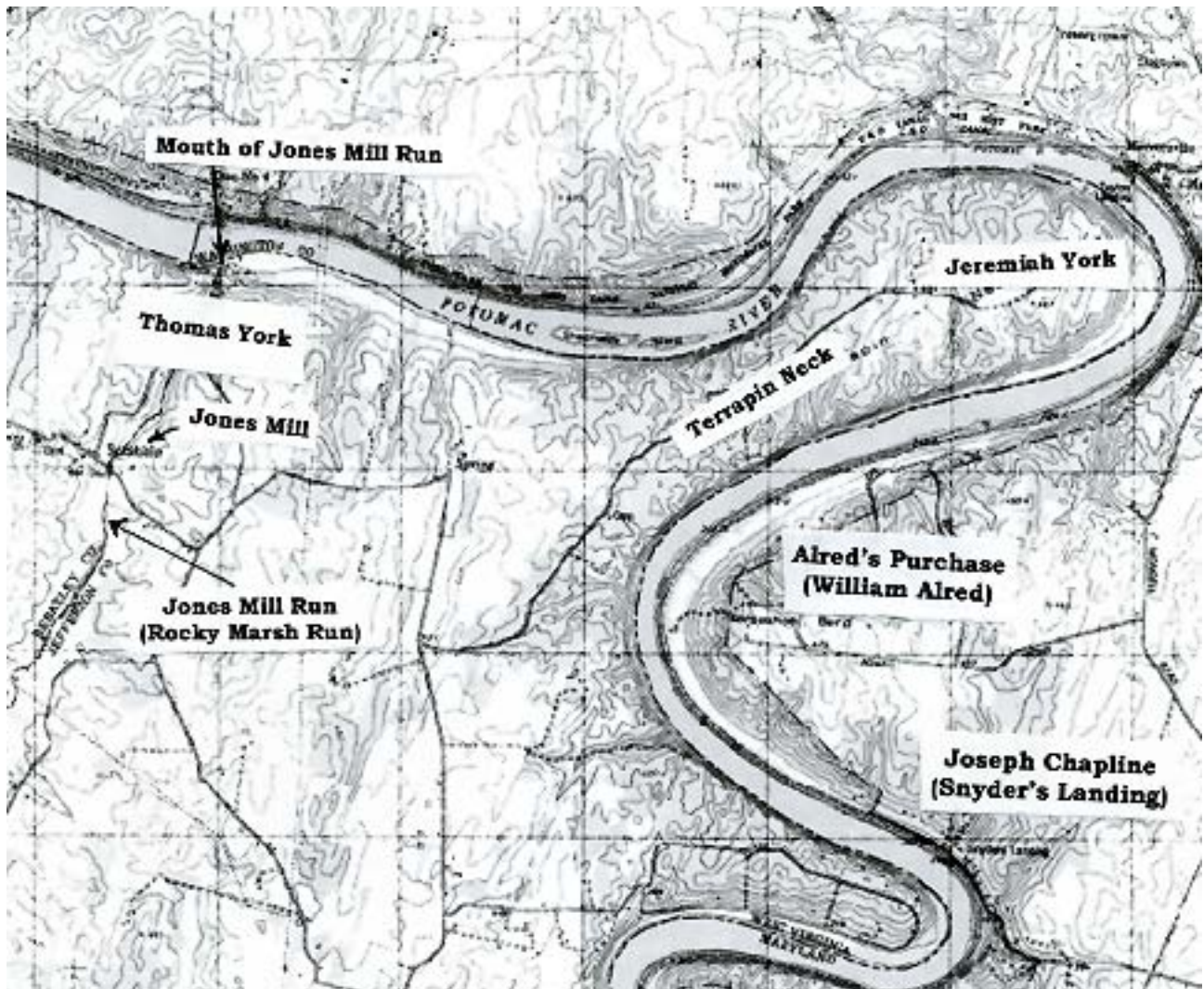

Land in Frederick County, Maryland, was quickly claimed as more and more immigrants from Europe came to America. New land became available as the British Crown expanded its holdings and white settlers pushed the Indians off their land.

In 1737, Henry McCulloh received a royal patent for 1.2 million acres in central and western North Carolina. He quickly began making land grants available so he could collect rent. In 1748 the second Earl of Granville began making land grants available for the land he owned in central

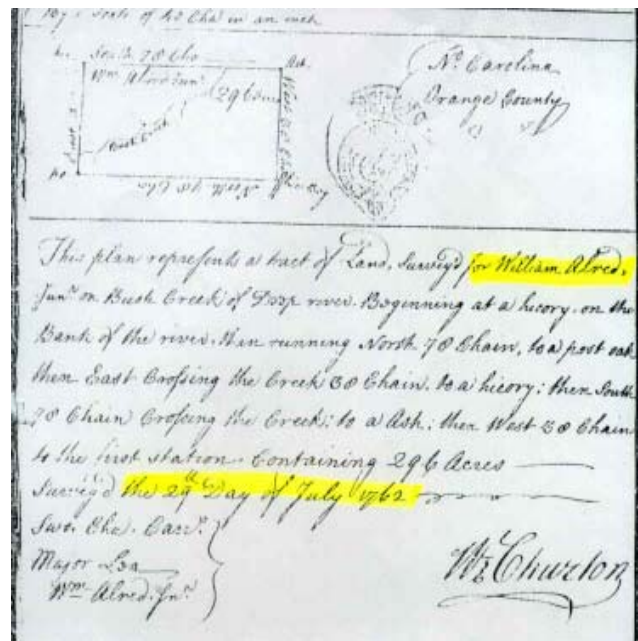
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and western North Carolina. Word of the new land was advertised in Maryland and Pennsylvania creating a flood of settlers moving south to claim their piece of the American Pie.

During this same time period, the Indians were being pushed off their land in Maryland and Pennsylvania and became increasingly hostile. In the late 1740s, although there were few, if any, white settlers west of the Allegheny Mountains, the British Colony of Virginia laid claim to all of the lands as far west as the “islands of California.” White traders began travelling to the Ohio River Valley to trade and tensions grew between the Indians and Whites. Tensions also grew as Indian Tribes such as the Shawnee and Lenape who originally lived in what is now eastern Pennsylvania. By the 1720s they were forced into the Ohio River Valley by the white settlers’ migration and had come under the control and government of the Iroquois Nation which they resented. The French, who also claimed ownership of land west of the Alleghenies, became upset by the invading white traders, beginning trickle of white settlers and growing Indian tensions. All of this exploded in 1755 creating the French and Indian War.

All of these increasing tensions combined with the newly available land in North Carolina accounts for many of the people who decided to leave Pennsylvania and Maryland and move south. I imagine these reasons, perhaps combined with William Allred’s court battles with his neighbors Thomas Kelley and Joseph Robinette/Robinson, most likely played a large part in Allred’s decision to sell his land in Frederick County in 1752.

Oct 2, 1752 Charles Higginbotham recorded 2 Oct 1752, made 14 Sep 1752, between WILLIAM ALRED of Frederick County gentleman, for 70 pcm tract called “Alred’s Purchase” for 8 acres, also part of a tract called “Bedlam Green,” and another tract part of “Pile’s Delight,” at the end of the last course mentioned,

William’s purported father, Solomon Allred, had already received a land grant in 1752 in North Carolina. Thus William had added incentive to move south. Rules for claiming land were much different in that time period. Many families moved onto the land, built homes and farmed, then went to court to finalize everything when they had a chance. William may have done just that, lived on the land before going to court to file the official paper work, or he may have lived with family for a while. Whatever the reason for the delay, 10 years after selling his land in Maryland, William Allred obtained a grant for 296 acres on July 29, 1762. This land is now known as “The Original William Allred Land” located on today’s map at Cedar Falls, Randolph County, North Carolina.

Editor’s Note: AFO No. 67, pages 3-7, has an article on the Land of Jeremiah and Thomas York in old Frederick County, Virginia, across the Potomac River from William Allred in Frederick County, Maryland. Both Solomon Allred, purported father of William Allred, and Jeremiah York were on tax lists in West Nottingham Township of Chester County, Pennsylvania. The families moved and bought land near each other along the Potomac River on what was then the western frontier of America.

An Early House of Worship and Schooling for an Allred Family in Bedford County, Tennessee

In 1805, members of the family of William and Elizabeth Thrasher Allred began to move to land in Bedford County, Tennessee. The land is approximately 50 miles south of Nashville. The land, just south of the Duck River along Rock Creek, was recently opened for settlement just prior to their arrival.

Eighteen Allreds moved to Bedford County and began buying land for their growing families. They moved from Franklin County in Northeast Georgia. This is the list of the adults and their young children who moved from Georgia to Tennessee.

William and Elizabeth Thrasher Allred were the parents of Sarah, Mary, James, Isaac, William, Martha and John. About 1800/1, Sarah/Sally Allred married Anderson Ivie. Their first three children were born in Georgia: Polly Ann Ivie was born in 1801; James Russell Ivie was born in 1802, and John Anderson Ivie was born in 1804/05. They moved as a young family to Bedford County.

About 1802, Mary/Polly Allred married David Sanders: Their first two children were born in Georgia: Moses Martin Sanders was born in 1803 and William Hamilton Sanders was born in 1805. They purchased land in Bedford County.

In 1803, James Allred married Elizabeth Warren: Their first child, William Hackley Allred was born in 1804 in Georgia. This young family moved on to Kentucky where James worked to earn money to move back to Bedford County with other family members. This he did about 1811.

The younger children, Isaac, William, Martha and John moved with their parents to this area of Tennessee.

Shelbyville the Bedford County Seat, was approximately 15 miles east of their land. The

small town of Farmington, was approximately five miles south of their land.

On June 1, 1810, the Rev. Samuel Finley of Kentucky organized the Bethbirei Presbyterian Church just east of the land owned by the Allred, Ivie, Sanders families and their neighbors.

None of these Allred names appear on the list of charter members, but names of many of their neighbors are on the list.

The church also housed the Bible Society on Rock Creek. This was a non-denominational group that distributed Bibles "by gift." The Bibles were obtained from the Society headquartered in Philadelphia. The Bibles came from Philadelphia via boat to Nashville and then by wagon to the small town of Farmington. For many years, Bibles were distributed in that area of Tennessee. Many of the families wrote births, marriages, deaths and other family information in their Bibles. None of the Allred family Bibles from Tennessee are known to have survived.

The Rock Creek Sabbath School was established August 27, 1827. The Sabbath School was held at the log Bethbirei church building. Children were instructed in reading and writing through the Bible.

The church held yearly camp meetings and there are references to these meetings by William Moore Allred in his autobiography: "I was born on the 24th of December 1819 in Bedford County, fifty miles south of the City of Nashville, [Tennessee]. My parents were very religious. I believe they belonged to the Presbyterian Church. I never had much chance for an education, and it was very old fashioned (education) at that. I remember of going to Sabbath school a few times where I was born and went a few times to the camp meetings, but yet I was too young to understand much about doctrine."

The small log church was both a house of worship and a school for children. Other events were held there such as a harmonic society.

In 1829, the family of Anderson and Sarah Ivie moved from Bedford County to eastern Missouri along the Salt River. The Ivie heads of households appear on the 1830 Federal Census in Ralls County, Missouri.

The Allred heads of households appear on the 1830 Federal Census in Bedford County, Tennessee. Apparently soon after this census was taken, most of the Allreds moved to Missouri and

joined the Ivie families along the Salt River. Soon after their arrival, the area where these families lived became Monroe County.

Tennessee was very important to this branch of the Allred family. Eighteen members of the family moved there about 1805 and by 1830 the family of William and Elizabeth Thrasher Allred had grown to 89 people. William Allred died there between 1825 and 1830. Many genealogy records have his death date as 1808. However, his father, Thomas Allred, died in 1809 and left him 12 shillings. Also, he is recorded on the 1812 tax records in Bedford County as well as other later records.

Elizabeth Thrasher Allred moved to Missouri. She died there in 1841. She was living with Sarah Allred and Anderson Ivie at the time of her death.

In 1836, several years after these Allred families left Tennessee for new lands in Missouri, the area where they lived in Bedford County became Marshall County, Tennessee.

Below, beginning in the left column, is the listing of the family of William and Elizabeth Thrasher Allred and their growth over a 43 year period from North Carolina to the time the growing family left Tennessee.

Who Left North Carolina?

In 1787, William¹ and Elizabeth Thrasher² Allred left Randolph County in Central North Carolina and traveled to Pendleton County, South Carolina, with their first four children. Pendleton County then covered most of Western South Carolina. It has been divided into several counties and Pendleton County no longer exists.

The first four children were:

1. Sarah Allred³: Born about 1781/82.
2. Mary Allred⁴: Born about 1783.
3. James Allred⁵: Born in 1784.
4. Elizabeth Allred⁶: Born in 1786.

6 people left North Carolina for South Carolina

Who Left South Carolina?

The family of William and Elizabeth Thrasher Allred lived in Pendleton County, South Carolina, for approximately three years. William Allred

(Allred) was on the 1790 Federal Census for the Pendleton District of South Carolina. This was the first Federal Census.

On this census, only the name of the head of the household is listed. However, this indicates that the young Elizabeth was not alive at the time the census was taken. Also, there is debate as to whether the son, William, was born in South Carolina or Georgia. The census indicates, William was born in South Carolina.

The family in 1790:

Parents: William¹ and Elizabeth Thrasher² Allred and children: Sarah³, Mary⁴ and James⁵ born in North Carolina.

Born in South Carolina:

Isaac Allred⁶: Born in South Carolina in 1788.

William Allred⁷: Born in South Carolina in January 1790. Note: The census was taken in August of 1790.

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Who Left Georgia?

In the early 1790s, William¹ and Elizabeth Thrasher² Allred, moved from South Carolina into the old Franklin County, in Northeast Georgia. With them were their children: Sarah³, Mary⁴, James⁵, Isaac⁶, and William⁷.

Born in Georgia

Their daughter, Martha⁸, was born there in 1794 and their son, John⁹, was born there in 1796.

Georgia Marriages

About 1800/1, Sarah/Sally Allred married Anderson Ivie¹⁰. Their first three children were born in Georgia: Polly Ann Ivie¹¹ was born in 1801; James Russell Ivie¹² was born in 1802, and John Anderson Ivie¹³ was born in 1804/05.

About 1802, Mary/Polly Allred married David Sanders¹⁴: Their first two children were born in Georgia: Moses Martin Sanders¹⁵ was born in 1803 and William Hamilton Sanders¹⁶ was born in 1805.

In 1803, James Allred married Elizabeth Warren¹⁷: Their first child, William Hackley Allred¹⁸ was born in 1804 in Georgia.
