Once again - the September 2006 reunion was a wonderful success! As you know, our theme this year has been the American Revolution and how our ancestors participated.

Thursday and Friday were spent visiting Revolutionary War Battlefields at Kings Mountain, Trading Ford on the Yadkin River, Cowpens and Guilford Court House. We visited Historic Salisbury, site of one of the oldest public wells in central North Carolina. Presidents George Washington, Andrew Jackson and General Cornwallis all would have drank from this well.

Friday afternoon was spent touring some of the family and historic sites in Randolph County including Faith Rock, site of another Revolutionary War story. Our last stop was at the ancient Allred-Trogdon Cemetery where several Revolutionary War veterans are buried.

Saturday was our main reunion day. Everyone gathered at Grays Chapel School for activities that began at 10am with the 1682 ocean voyage of the ship *Submission*. Although some complained about sea sickness, especially during the storm, and there was snow on the ground when the ship docked on the Choptank River in Maryland, everyone enjoyed the voyage and came away with a new appreciation for what our ancestors endured during their own ship voyages to the New World.

How did we manage to sail across the ocean in 1682? You'll just have to come to the next reunion and find out for yourself! AFO President, Eddie Clay Allred, a Randolph County resident, greeted his cousins and talked about his excitement about current Allred research.

People attended the reunion from Washington, Texas, Utah, Florida, Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina. Judith Smith-Ross, Everett, Washington, traveled the furthest distance to attend the reunion. She descends from the "original William" Allred.

225th Anniversary of the Battle of Yorktown

Five members of the East Coast Allred Family Association traveled to Virginia to join in the celebration of the 225th Anniversary of the Battle of Yorktown and the surrender of the British under General Cornwallis. Several thousand people attended the various celebrations and reenactments, many of which were broadcast on television stations including CNN and MSNBC. In keeping with the 2006 ECAFA theme, the American Revolution and how our ancestors participated, we felt a great way to end the year would be attending the celebrations. Attending were Alice Allred Pottmyer, Sara Allred, Becky Allred Sexton, Ruth Ann Marley Jones and Linda Allred Cooper.

Thursday, October 19, the actual anniversary date, we spent the day in Yorktown. After watching the huge parade through the historic streets, we walked down to the water front to visit the ships docked there. These ships were replicas of 17th and 18th Century ships and staffed by crew members in period dress who gave tours and explained how life would have been on the high seas. A wonderful Brunswick Stew lunch was served on the grounds of Christ Church, one of the oldest churches in America. Local Allred cousin, Jean V. Helm, joined us and spent the afternoon guiding us around the historic town and sharing wonderful stories about the area. Friday, October 20, was spent in Jamestown. Everyone was amazed by the archealogical "dig" and artifacts that have been uncovered at the original Jamestown site. The museum and replica of the original fort was incredible and stories of John Smith and Pocohantas were shared by guides standing on the very sites where the stories took place. Our favorite part was touring more 17th century ships. One of these ships was estimated to be like the ship, *Submission*, which our ancestors, the Pembertons, sailed on in 1682. As we stood in the "tween deck" and listened to the guide's descriptions, we gained a new perspective of that ocean voyage. If you have never been to Jamestown, we highly recommend it! The 400th Anniversary celebration of Jamestown is scheduled for all of 2007.

Saturday, October 21, was spent in Colonial Williamsburg. Reenactors in period dress were everywhere and gave us a real sense of having traveled back in time. The reenactors were "in character" and would talk and carry on conversations as if the decade was 1770 - 1780. The tour of the Governor's Mansion included a presentation about the Colonial Social Life parties and gala balls. Did you know George Washington was very much sought after as a dance partner, hailed as one of the best dancers in Virginia? As we walked and/or sat to rest, we could over hear Patrick Henry and Colonel George Washington discussing the pros and cons of going to War with England. We talked with some women who were concerned about their husbands and sons going off to war. One young woman selfishly complained that she didn't want the War because it would mean no more shipments from England - where she bought all of her clothes. Several slaves were in town sharing their opinions of what freedom from England would mean for them.

At the House of Burgesses we watched the debate and listened to the arguments pro and con for War, then we watched as some troops marched off to battle. By the time we climbed back into the car for the ride home, we had a new appreciation for the American Revolution and what our ancestors experienced.
