1678 Letter

Current research leads many of us to believe the American Allreds descend from Solomon Allred born 1680 in Eccles Parish, Lancashire, England. Solomon was the youngest child of John Allred and his wife Ellen Pemberton.

Although Ellen was actually Ralph Pemberton's first cousin, she was raised in his home and treated like his sister. Therefore, Ralph's son, Phineas, called her Aunt Ellen and, after her marriage, he called her husband Uncle John.

Ralph and Phineas were merchants and, based on family letters, they ran a fairly successful business selling wool and cotton cloth, tobacco and some food items such as currants. Both Ralph and Phineas seem to have traveled a lot to keep their supplies stocked and customers happy. Both wrote home often and thankfully Phineas kept these letters, bringing them with him on the ship, *Submission*, when the family left England in 1682 to live in Pennsylvania. Around 1950, Phineas' descendants gave the entire collection of letters, journals, and other documents to the Historical Society of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. The AFO purchased microfilm copies of these documents and I have been slowly transcribing them to glean clues about John Allred and family.

The following letter was written by Phineas Pemberton to his father, Ralph, on November 2,

1678. Phineas was in Boulton, England, and Ralph was in Radcliffe, England. The letter is full of tidbits about their business, names of some Quaker Friends and Meetings, and at the end of the letter is some information about a visit from Uncle John Allred. Once again, we see proof that John was very poor but the Pemberton family obviously helped him when they could.

Blank spaces denote words I could not read. Old English is a challenge at times. Note: Phineas used his initials to sign the letter (PP) and his wife's first initial, P for Pheobe when talking about John's visit. The Jon mentioned in the first part of the letter is a young apprentice boy - not to be confused with Uncle John Allred.

To Fa: If thou had given me an note of what was wanting this day
it might have done well for tomorrow I thinke to send Jon: with
what is mentioned in this note now ___ this next week Jon
has a desire to go & see his relations & I thinke to lett him go so
that I thinke it will be best to put off thy coming until Jon returns
and then go for Aspull & if thou canst buy some cloth at Wiggan

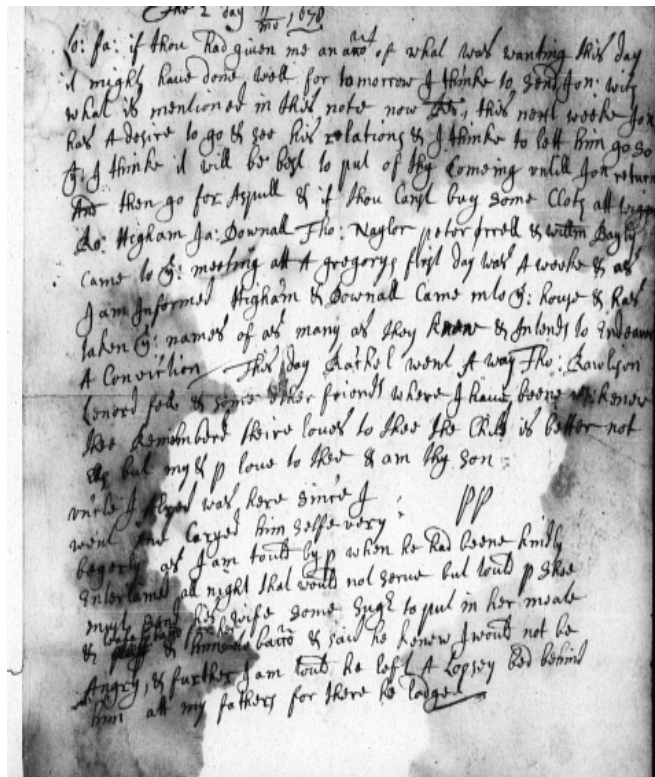

This letter provides an insight into the lives of one of the earliest Allred relatives we can document.

Why So Much Tennessee?

began the trek West wound up in Tennessee at some point during their travel. Thus, the importance of the Tennessee Time Line for our family.

The largest Tennessee Allred families are the William and Elizabeth Thrasher Allred family that was in Bedford County from approximately 1805 to 1830. This group is the basis for today's Rocky Mountain Allreds. Several members of the Solomon Allred family settled in Overton County and many still live there. There were others such as Renne Allred who settled in Texas in 1836 and briefly lived in Tennessee.

2009 Financial Health of the AFO

The Allred Family Organization miraculously ended the year in the black despite a significant loss of income from membership. Glancing at the Year End Financial Report for 2009 you can see that our income is primarily derived from memberships (\$6563). We also received \$183 in voluntary donations, \$90 from sales of newsletter CDs and \$11 interest.

Our primary expenses are in communication. We financially support the AFO website managed by Linda Allred Cooper (\$335) and the AFO Newsletter produced by Alice Allred Pottmyer (\$3,121, printing and mailing). There were no AFO funded research trips in 2009 but despite the decrease in membership we were still able to escrow the budgeted \$1800 plus the \$1300 difference between income and expenses.

We all need to help AFO in 2010 by keeping our AFO membership current, eliminating the need for our Treasurer to send renewal reminders. This will reduce the cost of having postcards reproduced and mailed. Please, refer to the mailing list on your newsletter for your expiration date. Don't let your membership lapse.

Our 2009 income from memberships is well below the budgeted amount of \$7500 because our membership dropped over the year. This may be in part due to the recession. A couple members have notified me they will not be renewing. Approximately 25 others had not renewed when this article was written (despite receiving reminders in the mail) including six gift memberships from family members. Additionally, several members passed away during the year.

Even though our primary source of income decreased, we were able to end in the black. The decrease in membership resulted in the need to print and mail fewer newsletters which is our primary expense. There were no funds expended for research. The \$1800 escrow in the 2008 budget was met and the \$1300 difference in income and expenses was also escrowed to research.

Isaac Allred served Mormon missions to Central Missouri: December 12, 1837, to March 18, 1838; Southern Illinois and Western Kentucky: June 11, 1838, to September 29, 1838, and Northeastern Missouri, October 26, 1842, to November 25, 1842. He served a fourth mission to England, but no diary has been found.

The author held off interested readers promising a “second edition.” Before the author was able to publish the “second edition,” she passed away in 2005. At first we persisted in the goal to produce a “second edition” rather than reprint the first edition. Because the “second edition” is taking more time than contemplated and will take substantial additional time, we have decided to reprint the first edition. Available in about two to three months is an edited reprint of the first edition. It is not the long awaited “Second Edition” that the author had been working on for years. 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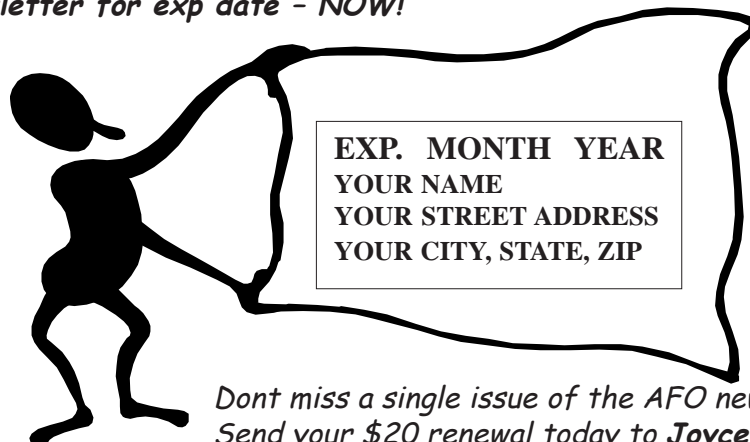
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The AFO publishes a quarterly newsletter containing the latest family research news, family stories, photos and reunion information. It is a great way to keep up with your Allred family.
