AFO Past President Kay J. Allred

Allred Family Organization Past President, Kay James Allred, 85, Shelley, Idaho, died October 6, 2012, at Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center. He served as AFO President from 2003 to 2005.

Kay was born in Paris, Idaho, June 4, 1927, to Fenton Reel Allred and Sybil Sparks on his dad's 26th birthday. He attended school in Paris. He was active in student government and earned varsity letters in three sports. Kay grew up on a beef ranch where the work was done by hand, with the help of horses. Tractors did not arrive on the farm until 1944.

After graduating from Fielding High School in 1945, Kay was drafted into the Army, serving at Camp Roberts, Fort Ord, Camp Stoneman and Fort Lewis as a private in Company E, 1st Battalion, 23rd Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division. He was honorably discharged.

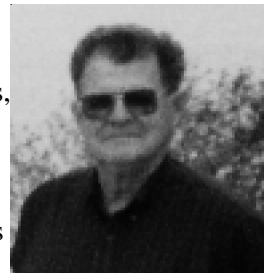
Kay married Donna Heninger in April 1947. A daughter, Beverly, was born in of August 1953. They later divorced.

Kay attended the American Academy of Horology during 1948 and 1949 and became a Certified Master Watchmaker. He worked 36 years as a bench jeweler and in retail jewelry management.

While working in American Fork, Utah, Kay met Beth Faddis Powelson. After a three-month courtship, they were married April 14, 1956. He became an "Instant Dad" to Beth's five children: Joy, Bruce, Brent, Diane and Kelly, ranging in age from eight years to 18 months. A son, Stan, was born in June 1959.

Kay and Beth enjoyed 56 years in a loving partnership. While raising their family, they traveled by station wagon throughout Idaho and Utah, as well as longer trips to the Allred Family Reunion in

Randolph County, North Carolina. There were also trips to Louisville, Kentucky; Dallas, Texas; Washington, D.C.; New York City; and Disneyland. He was known for choosing back roads for "short cuts." Kay was active in his community. He served in the Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club, Rotary Club and on the Montpelier City Council. He served as president of the Bear Lake Jaycees, and national director of the Idaho Jaycees. He was JCI International Senator No. 4069.

Kay joined his dad's cattle operation in 1957. They purchased property east of Bennington, Idaho, in 1967 and engineered a gravity flow irrigation system for the 125 acres of farm ground.

Kay is survived by his wife, Beth; children, Joy (Merlin) Price of Shelley, Bruce "Strawberry" (Debbie) Powelson of Draper, Utah, Brent (Margo) Powelson of Logan, Utah, Diane (Curt) Sandau of Lewiston, Idaho, Beverly (Gary) Archibald of Chubbuck, Idaho, Kelly (Evah Ann) Powelson of West Richland, Washington, and Stan (Mary) Allred of Richland, Washington; sister, Verna (Reed, deceased) Jensen; 34 grandchildren; and 48 great-grandchildren.

Kay was preceded in death by his parents and by great-grandchildren, Grace Allred and Lyle Gowey.

Funeral services were October 13, at the Shelley First Ward LDS Church. Burial with military rites followed at the Bennington Cemetery. *Kay J., Fenton Reel, William Ezra, Marvin A., William Moore, Isaac, William, Thomas.*

John Aldred of Eccles Lancashire England

In 1992, my husband and I traveled to England for the first time. One of our major stops was in the Greater Manchester area of Lancashire, County. There we visited the beautiful and stately St. Mary's parish church in Eccles. The present town of Eccles, which is in the city of Salford, grew up around this 13th century church. Although research was still ongoing at that time, we felt strongly that there was a connection between our Allred ancestors of North Carolina and the John Aldred/Alred and Ellen Pemberton family of Eccles. Shortly after our arrival the vicar of St. Mary's gave us a detailed tour of the ancient church and presented us with a booklet titled, *A Short History of Eccles Parish Church, Lancashire*, by the late Charles D. Hampson, J.L.

Following our tour, the vicar invited us to view

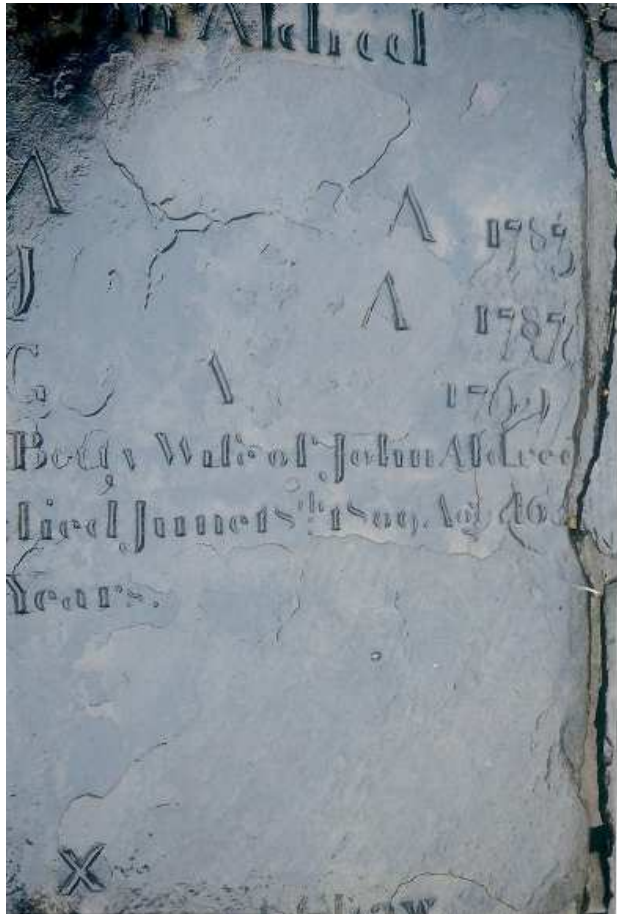
the grounds of the parish church. We noted that the headstones in the churchyard were few in number. We were told that many of the stones had been buried when the church's restoration took place. Those monuments which were saved and put on display around the foundation of the edifice, were chosen specifically to depict the various eras in which they were made. We had hoped to locate an Aldred/Alred headstone, and so we carefully looked at each monument and attempted to read the now worn writing upon them.

Behind St. Mary's Church we did find one Aldred stone. The surface was so badly weathered and worn that it was difficult to read, and even more difficult to photograph because of

its position near the shady foundation of the building. However, we did try to capture the inscriptions, and the photos that accompany this article are the result of those attempts. This



longer lining the walls of the church as they were on our first visit).

No relationship has been made between this John Aldred and our John Aldred/Alred and



headstone once marked the burial site of one John Aldred and his wife Betty. At the top of the stone is the name John Aldred. Below his name are three sets of initials and dates, which most likely refer to family members. Those inscriptions are listed as follows:

AA 1783 JA 1787 GA 1789?

Below the initials and dates, the inscription reads - - "Betty wife of John Aldred died June 18th 1809 age 46 years". That would put Betty's birth date at approximately 1763. It can be estimated that John Aldred would have been born about 1760. The name of the stone mason who carved the stone, Herbert Shaw, is visible in the lower left hand corner of the monument. Note: (On our last trip to Eccles in 2006, we found most of the headstones we had viewed in 1992, were no

Ellen Pemberton who lived in the area of Eccles parish between the 1630s and 1690s. However, because this was the only surviving Aldred headstone, we felt it was well worth documenting.

At a later date, we plan to further research this family to see what we might learn about the origins of John Aldred, and if there might be any connection with him to our ancestral family.

Perhaps one of our readers already has the answer to this question.

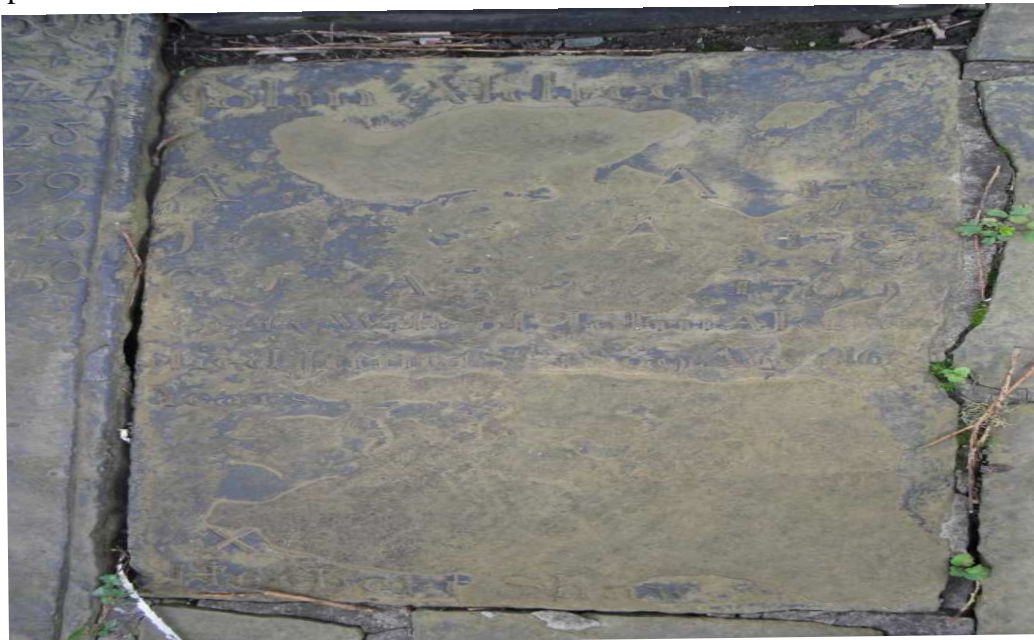

William Robert Aldred of London, England, and Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada

In 2008, while on a trip to New England and the Canadian provinces of Quebec, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, we visited the historic Fairview Lawn Cemetery in Halifax, Nova Scotia. This is the cemetery where more than one hundred victims of the *Titanic* were laid to rest. As we walked through the various rows of headstones for these men, women and children, we came upon a monument for one William R. Aldred. On the Aldred headstone it said: "At Rest, In Loving Memory of William R. Aldred, died 24 September 1915, age 53 years."

Being intrigued by finding the grave of an Aldred in this area, we took photos of the headstone, and upon our return home I did some

research for this individual, hoping to learn more about his life and death.

In searching the records of Halifax, Halifax, Nova Scotia, I learned the following: William Robert Aldred was born in London, England, in 1862. His death record stated that he died at age 53 in Halifax City of heart failure. It also mentioned that he had suffered from lung, heart, liver and kidney disease for two years. When he died, he was living at 118 Albermarle Street in Halifax City.

Further information stated that William was a cook by profession. He was married and belonged to the Church of England. An interesting attachment was made to his death certificate.

It was an affidavit given in 1923, by William's stepdaughter Jennie Ann Brown, who was shown to be a spinster when this record was created.

The document stated that William's name was erroneously entered as William R. Alder on a previous death certificate, and Miss Brown requested a correction of that record. She stated that Mr. Aldred was her stepfather and that on the marriage certificate for him and her mother and throughout his life in Halifax, he had always given his name as William Robert Aldred.

That request was granted and the death certificate was amended and corrected.

I did locate the marriage record for William Robert Aldred and Mary Ella Brown. They were married in Halifax City on 27 February 1905.

The marriage document stated that William was a widower and Mary Ella was a widow. The ages of both individuals were given as 43 years. It also stated that Mary Ella was born in Halifax and William was born in London, England.

Further searches showed that Mary was the widow of William Brown, born in Wales.

In searching the immigration records of Canada, I found an entry for William Aldred. This individual came to Halifax, Nova Scotia, on 17 December 1904, sailing from St. Johns, Newfoundland, on the Ship *S.S. Rosalind*.

The ship's register stated that William Aldred was 42 years of age and a cook by profession, which fit nicely with the information we had already located on him. William would only have been in Halifax for just over two months when he and Mary Ella Brown were married.

I did not pursue this line of research any further. However, I feel it is always prudent to be alert to any and all Allred/Aldred/Alred cousins, no matter how remote that relationship may be, whose graves we discover as we travel the broad expanse of this country and other nations abroad.

Who knows when we may come upon a long lost family member who has been waiting decades or even centuries to be found.

In a song by Arlen D. Wilcock, a wonderful sentiment is expressed in relation to searching for our kindred dead. In part those lyrics say, "Search for me. Long before the world was formed I knew you well. Search for me. Many years ago I came to earth to dwell. Search for me. Find my name among the ruins of the land.

Search for me. I only hope and pray that you will understand."

And so the journey continues in our search for our Allred ancestors wherever that journey takes us. We are exploring different paths within our own families, as well as in our Allred Family Organization. As Orson S. Card once said, "From dust they came, to dust they went. And among the flecks of dust I hunt for them."

Each step we take in our travels to find those that have gone before us, awakens our minds and hearts to the wonder and importance of our forefathers.



An Allred Longrifle from the 1700s

William W. “Bill” Ivey lives in Asheboro, North Carolina. By way of profession he is an attorney, but he is also widely recognized as an authority on antique furniture and decorative arts of the Piedmont region of the state, as well as on North Carolina pottery and longrifles. He is also a collector who has lectured widely on these subjects.

In 2010, he produced a monumental book called *North Carolina Schools of Longrifles, 1765-1865*. In it, he discusses in detail nine “schools” of longrifles based on their distinguishing features. They include Bear Creek, Deep River, Jamestown, Salem, Davidson, Rowan, Mecklenburg, Catawba Valley, and Appalachian. The Deep River school was based in Randolph, Guilford, and Alamance Counties in the period prior to 1820. Bill illustrates the Deep River school not only with many beautiful examples, but with discussion of makers and owners.

The author had a chance to talk to Bill about his book—and in fact bought one for his library—and mentioned his Allred connections in Randolph County. This prompted him to mention a gun he had owned that had descended in an Allred family that lived near Red Cross in Randolph County. This longrifle, which is shown and discussed on pages 72 and 73 of the book, is described as a “full-stock flintlock rifle with a wooden patch cover.” It appears to date from the eighteenth century and, according to the author, could possibly be associated with the Alexander Frazier shop or associate, who worked in the northern part of Randolph. Alternatively, it could have been made by David Gross who worked in neighboring Guilford County, or an associate of his. The wooden patchbox on the gun cover is secured to the stock with a wood screw and washer rather than the more usual type that slides into place.

Alexander Frazier the earlier was born in Randolph in 1776, while his son, Alexander the younger was born in 1797 and both were gunsmiths. The older Alexander was christened at Center Friends Meeting in present day Randolph in March 1776. David Gross (1781-1828) lived and worked in Guilford County. His shop was located on Friendly Road near New Garden Friends meeting in present day Greensboro.

Because the Allred longrifle is not signed, it is not possible to assign a precise attribution to it. The Allred family in which the gun descended is unknown to the author, but as noted earlier, they lived in the Red Cross vicinity.

She was born in Calcutta, British India, May 3, 1928, to Charles Stanley and Edna Mae Agacy Pacheco, the eldest of four children. She met her husband, Orvis Miles “Shorty” Allred, (*James Wosley, William Hackley, James Tillman Sanford, James, William, Thomas*) during his service in Calcutta as part of the Allied forces in World War II. They celebrated the end of the war during their engagement, and married in Calcutta at St. Thomas Church, December 18, 1945. They returned to Utah in June of 1946, where they lived in the Uintah Basin, Utah County, and Salt Lake City, until moving to Arizona and away from the winter (which she hated) in 2008. At a young age his family moved to Provo, Utah, where he later graduated from Timpview High School. He served an honorable 2-year mission in Mexico City, Mexico, for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (LDS) where he loved and served the people of Mexico. In 2006, Nick met and married Christy Lyn Morris. Their two daughters, Raigan, age 3, and Presley, 22 months, brought the greatest joy to his life. As a teenager, Nick learned to drive semi-trucks and operate heavy equipment. He loved working in that capacity and took every opportunity to do so. In 2008 he joined the U.S. Border Patrol. Nick's passion for the outdoors and horses lead him to joining, and becoming an instructor for the horse patrol. His love for and devotion to his God and country was only surpassed by his love and dedication to his family. There wasn't a day in his life that he didn't spend with his "three girls" either playing at the park, playing soccer, riding bikes, swimming, or dancing. His daughters couldn't wait for "daddy" to come home to play with them, tickle them, dance with them and laugh with them. Their day was not complete until daddy told them their nightly princess bedtime story, even if he had to tell them over the phone.
