John Lewis Allred applied for Citizenship in the Choctaw Nation in 1896. His application was denied but contains detailed information about his marriages, children and the application process.

John Lewis Allred and his wife and son appear on the 1900 Federal Census living in Tecumseh, Pottawatomie County, Oklahoma. He stated he was born 1867 in Texas and he was working as a Tonsorial Artist. Per the Merriam-Webster Dictionary: Tonsorial is a fancy word that describes the work of those who give shaves and haircuts. (It can apply more broadly to hairdressers as well.) It derives from the Latin verb tondere, meaning "to shear, clip, or crop." (Another descendant, tonsor, is an archaic word for a barber.)



JOHN LEVIS ALLRED, having been first duly sworn by Chairman Bixby, testified as follows:-

Examination by the Commission: Q What is your name? A John Lewis Allred.
Q How old are you? A Thirty-seven years old.
Q What is your postoffice address? A Tecumseh, Oklahoma.
Q Are you a citizen of Oklahoma Territory? A Yes sir.
Q How long have you lived there? A I have lived there six or seven years. You have made that your place of residence during that time ? A Yes sir. Do you own property there? A Yes sir.
Are you engaged in business in Oklahoma? A Yes sir.
Do you vote there? A Yes sir.
You have voted there in all the elections that have been held in Oklahoma since you have been there? A Yes sir.
Do you pay taxes in Tecumseh? A Yes sir.
Where did you live before that? A I lived in the Chickasaw Nation. Nation. How long did you live in the Chickasaw Nation ? A I couldn't say for certain; about ten years, though, I think.

Q Did you live in the Chickasaw Nation continuously for the ten years before you went to Oklahoma? A It would be hard for me to say, but I think it was continuously for eight or ten years.

Q Where were you living in the Territory? A I lived at Atlee, and I lived at Roff, and I lived at Davis and I lived at Center, and several places. Q Were you engaged in business in the Chickasaw Nation ? A Nothing only farming.
What is your father's name? A A L Allred.
What is your mother's name? A Hary Allred.
Are your father and mother living? A No sir, my mother is living. Is your father dead ? A Yes sir. Q Were your father and mother both white people? A Yes sir.
Q Are you a citizen of the United States? A Yes sir.
Q You claim to be an intermarried citizen of the Choctaw Nation,
I believe? A Yes sir.
Q What is the name of your Choctaw wife? A Lissie Stidham.
Q Is she living? A I suppose she is, she was the last news I had of her.

Is she present ? A No sir, she has married since we separated. What is her present name ? A I believe it is Whitner.

Was she a citizen by blood of the Chostaw Mation ? A Yes sir. Q You say her maiden name was Stidham ? A Yes sir-

> The applicant's wife is identified upon the records of the Commission on Choctaw Roll Card Field No.247, and upon the final roll of citizens by blood of the Choctaw Nation opposite No.14508 as Lizzie Whitner.

When were you married to Lissie Stidham? A In 1893, I think. Were you ever married before your marriage to her? A Yes sir. How mant times? A Once.

Who was your first wife? A Her na Was she a white woman? A Yes gir. Her name was Keel.

Was she dead when you married Limie Stidham? A Yes sir.
Did you live with your first wife up to the time of her death?
A Yes sir. Was Lizzie Stidham ever married before she married you? A Not

that I know of. Where you married to Lizzie Stidham in 1893 ? A The place was

named Grady or Brady, I couldn't tell which. Who married you? A A man named Duncan.

Were you married under a Chickman license ? A Yes sir.
From whom did you procure the license ? A I believe at was

A Chickasaw Indian ? A Yes sir. How much did you pay for the license ? A Fifty dollars. That was in 1893 ? A Yes sir.

How long did you live with this woman ? A Ags well as I remember

about eight months.

Q Were you divorced from her? A Mes sir.

Q When were you divorced from her? A It was in the spring, in April, I believe; the next spring after we separated in the fall, I think it was.

Have you remarried since then ? A Yes sir.

How many times? A Once.

Whom did you marry? A Mollie Smith.

Was she a white woman? A Yes sir.

Are you living with her now? A Yes sir.

In 1896 you made application to the Dawes Commission to be admitted as an intermarried citizen, did you not? A I believe it was about then.

You had a petition drawn up and forwarded to the Commission ? Yes sir.

Q Did you ever get any notice of the action taken on that petition? Yes sir.

What action was taken? A I can't say positively about that I have forgotten. My attorney at Ardmore, as well as I remember, wrote and said I was put on the roll.

Q Was any appeal ever taken to the United States court in your case? A No sir, I don't think there was.

Q About how long after you submitted that petition in 1896 was it before you went to Oklahoma? A About two years, I think-it before you went to Oklahoma? A About two years, I think-it was over one year and I don't think quite two.

Q When did you actually remove to Tecumseh, Oklahoma? A The 11th day of March, 1897 or 1898--I wouldn't say which.

Q You have lived in Tecumseh continuously since that time?

Yes sir. Q Have you since the time you removed to Tecumseh ever personally been before the Commission and made application for enrollment as an intermarried citizen? A Yes sir. A At Ardmore.

In what year ? A I believe in 1898. What time in 1898 ? A It seems to me it was September--August or September.

Were you sworn at that time? A Yes sir. Your testimony was taken? A Yes sir. What else happened at that time? A I don't know as there was

anything.
Did anybody tell you anything about your case? A Not that I know of, only my lawyer he wanted to take an appeal on it.
Take an appeal from what? A I don't know--to the Secretary of the Interior or something. I told him I didn't have any money to the Interior or something. I told him I didn't have any money pay him or do anything with it.
You were personally before the Commission at Ardmore, then, in the fall of 1898? A Yes sir, I think it was in 1898.
Who was your lawyer at that time? A Norman, I think.
Was he with you at the time you went before the Commission?
A Yes sir.

Is he here today? A Not that I know of, I haven't seen him-

It appears from the record herein that on May 8, 1893, the applicant, John Lewis Allred, was married, in accordance with the laws, customs and usages of the Chickasaw Nation, to Lizzie Stidham, a recognized and enrolled citizen by blood of the Choctaw Nation whose name (as Lizzie Whitner) appears as No. 14508 upon a list prepared by the Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved July 1, 1902 (32 Stats., 641), of persons entitled to enrollment as citizens by blood of the Choctaw Nation, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 20, 1903; that at the date of said marriage, both persons above mentioned were residents in good faith of the Chickasaw Nation; that they lived together continuously as husband and wife in said nation for about eight months, when they separated and were subsequently divorced; and that thereafter the applicant was married to Mollie Smith, a non-citizen white woman with whom he has since resided.

It appears from the records of the Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes that on September 9, 1896, in the case entitled "J. L. Allred vs. Choctaw Nation," (1896 Choctaw Citizenship Docket, case No. 376), original application was made to said Commission for the admission of the applicant to citizenship in the Choctaw Nation, as a citizen by intermarriage, which application was, on December 2, 1896, granted by said Commission from which decision no appeal was taken.

It further appears from the record herein that said

It further appears from the record herein that said applicant left the Indian Territory on March 11, 1897 or 1898, voluntarily abandoning his residence in the Choctaw-Chickasaw country, Indian Territory, since which time he has resided and become an actual resident of the Territory of Oklahoma.

Section 21 of the Act of Congress approved June 28,
1898 (30 Stats., 495), provides:

"No person shall be enrolled who has not heretofore removed to and in good faith settled in the Nation in which he claims citizenship.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that the application made for the enrollment of John Lewis Allred as a citizen by intermarriage of the Choctaw Nation should be denied, under the provisions of the Act of Congress above cited, and it is so prefered. ordered.

Sir:

October 31, 1905, you transmitted the record in re application of John Lewis Allred for his enrollment as a citizen by intermarriage of the Choctaw Nation, including your decision of the same date, denying said application, on the ground that applicant voluntarily abandoned his residence in the Chectaw-Chickasaw country on March 11, 1897 or 1898, and was not a bona fide resident on Juna 28, 1898, of the nation in which he claimed citizenship.

January 10, 1906, you transmitted a motion to set aside your decision of above date, on the ground that applicant's removal to Oklahoma Territory in 1897 or 1898, was not such a removal as would bar him from enrollment under the provisions of section 21 of the act of June 28, 1898, and that there is nothing in the laws of the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations that bars his right to enrollment on the ground of nonresidence. For the purpose of this decision it is unnecessary to decide whether the Choctaw Nation recognized any law of expatriation.

The record shows that John Lewis Allred, a white man, was married in pursurance of a Chickasaw tribal license on May 8, 1893, to Lizzie Stidham, duly enrolled as Lizzie Whitner, apposite No. 14508 upon the approved rell of citizens by blood of the Choctaw Nation, both parties at the time of said marriage being residents of the Chickasaw Nation, and that they lived together continuously as husband and wife for eight months, when they separated and were subsequently divorced. The husband afterwards married a noncitizen white woman, and in April, 1897, or 1898, removed to Oklahoma Territory, where he established a permanent residence, entered into business, declared he was a citizen of Oklahoma, and voted at the elections therein.

The laws of the Chectaw Nation as to intermarriage, adopted November 9, 1875 (see Chectaw Laws and Constitution, edition 1867, page 171), requires that any white man, desiring to marry a Chectaw weman, citizen of the Chectaw Nation, shall be and is hereby required to obtain a license for the same from one of the circuit clerks or judges of a court or record, etc. "The white man must marry in the nation he wishes to become a member of by intermarriage according to its laws and regulations, and reside therein thereafter with his wife." (See Lula B. Trahern vs. Chectaw and Chickasaw nations, reported 11th annual report, Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes, page 132).

No claim is made that applicant was married to a Choctaw

woman in accordance with Chectaw law and thereafter resided with her in the Chectaw Nation, but the evidence is clear that applicant was married to a Chectaw woman in the Chickasaw Nation under a Chickasaw law, and that he resided with said Chectaw woman in the Chickasaw Nation.

The motion to set aside your decision of October 31, 1905, denying the application of John Lewis Allred for enrollment as an intermarried citizen of the Choctaw Nation is hereby denied, and your decision of said date is hereby affirmed, upon the ground that applicant was not married to a Choctaw woman in accordance with the laws, customs and usages of the Choctaw Nation.

You will so advise applicant's attorney of record, Charles von Weise.

A copy of the Indian Office letter, recommending affirmance of your decision, is inclosed.

It further appears that on December 2, 1896, the applicant was, by the Commission to the Pive Civilized Tribes, admitted as a citizen by intermarriage of the Choctaw Nation and that no appeal was taken from that decision.

It further appears that on March 11, 1897 or 1898, the applicant left the Indian Territory, abandoning his residence in the Choctaw-Chickasaw country, since which time he has resided and become an actual resident of the Territory of Oklahoma.

In view of the record and of Section 21 of the Act of June 28, 1898 (30 Stats., 495), the approval of the Commissioner's decision adverse to the applicant is recommended.

It appears from the record herein that on May 8, 1893, the applicant. John Lewis Allred, was married, in accordance with the laws, customs and usages of the Chickesaw Nation, to Lizzie Stidham, a recognized minimum abandant and enrolled citizen by blood of the Choctaw Nation whose name (as Lizzie Whitner) appears as No.14508 upon a list prepared by the Commiswhither, appears as No.14500 upon a list prepared by the Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved July 1, 1902 (32 Stats., 641), of persons entitled to enrollment as citizens by blood of the Choctaw Nation, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 20, 1903; that at the date of said marriage, both persons above mentioned were residents in good faith of the Chickasaw Nation; that they lived together continuously as husband and wife insaid Nation for about eight months, when they separated and were subsequently divorced; and that thereafter the applicant was married to Mollie mith, a non-citizen white woman with whom he has since resided.

It appears from the records of the Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes that on September 9, 1896, in the case entitled "J.L.Allred vs.Choctaw Nation," (1896 Choctaw Citizenship Docket, case No. 376), original application was made to said Commission for the admission of the applicant to citizenship in the Choctaw Nation, as a citizen by intermarriage, which application was, on December 2, 1896, granted by said Commission from which decision no appeal was taken.

It further appears from the record herein that said applicant left the Indian Territory on March 11, 1897 or 1898, voluntarily abandoning his residence in the Choctaw-Chickasaw country, Indian Territory, since which time he has resided and become an actual resident of the Territory of Oklahoma.

Section 21 of the Act of Congress approved June 28, 1898

(30 Stats., 495), provides:
"No person shall be enrolled who has not heretofore removed to and in good faith settled in the Nation in which he claims citizenship.....

I am , therefore, of the opinion that the application made for the enrollment of John Lewis Allred as a critizen by intermarriage of the Choctaw Nation should be denied, under the provisions of the Act of Congress above cited, and it is so ordered.

Sir:

October 31, 1905, you transmitted the record in re application of John Lewis Allred for his enrollment as a citizen by intermarriage of the Choctaw Nation, including your decision of the same date, denying said application, on the ground that applicant voluntarily abandoned his residence in the Choctaw-Chickasaw country on March 11, 1897 or 1898, and was not a bona fide resident on June 28, 1898, of the nation in which he claimed citizenship.

January 10, 1906, you transmitted a motion to set aside your decision of above date, on the ground that applicant's removal to Oklahoma Territory in 1897 or 1898, was not such a removal as would bar him from enrollment under the provisions of section 21 of the act of June 28, 1898, and that there is nothing in the laws of the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations that bars his right to enrollment on the ground of nonresidence. For the purpose of this decision it is unnecessary to decide whether the Choctaw Nation recognized any law of expatriation.

The record shows that John Lewis Allred, a white man, was married in pursurance of a Chickasaw tribal license on May 8, 1893, to Lizzie Stidham, duly enrolled as Lizzie Whitner, apposite No. 14508 upon the approved roll of citizens by blood of the Choctaw Nation, both parties at the time of said marriage being residents of the Chickasaw Nation, and that they lived together continuously as husband and wife for eight months, when they separated and were subsequently divorced. The husband afterwards married a noncitizen white woman, and in April, 1897, or 1898, removed to Oklahoma Territory, where he established a permanent residence, entered into business, declared he was a citizen of Oklahoma, and voted at the elections therein.

The laws of the Choctaw Nation as to intermarriage, adopted November 9, 1875 (see Choctaw Laws and Constitution, edition 1887, page 171), requires that any white man, desiring to marry a Choctaw woman, citizen of the Choctaw Nation, shall be and is hereby required to obtain a license for the same from one of the circuit clerks or judges of a court or record, etc. "The white man must marry in the nation he wishes to become a member of by intermarriage according to its laws and regulations, and reside therein thereafter with his wife." (See Lula B. Trahern vs. Choctaw and Chickasaw nations, reported 11th annual report, Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes, page 132).

No claim is made that applicant was married to a Choctaw

woman in accordance with Choctaw law and thereafter resided with her in the Choctaw Nation, but the evidence is clear that applicant was married to a Choctaw woman in the Chickasaw Nation under a Chickasaw law, and that he resided with said Choctaw woman in the Chickasaw Nation.

The motion to set aside your decision of October 31, 1905, denying the application of John Lewis Allred for enrollment as an intermarried citizen of the Choctaw Nation is hereby denied, and your decision of said date is hereby affirmed, upon the ground that applicant was not married to a Choctaw woman in accordance with the laws, customs and usages of the Choctaw Nation.

You will so advise applicant's attorney of record, Charles von Weise.

A copy of the Indian Office letter, recommending affirmance of your decision, is inclosed.

I have the honor to enclose a report from the Commissioner to the Five Civilized Tribes dated October 31, 1905, transmitting the record of the application for enrollment as a citizen by intermarriage of the Choctaw Nation by John Lewis Allred.

October 31, 1905, the Commissioner decied adversely to the applicant.

The record shows that on May 8, 1893, the applicant was married in accordance withthe laws, customs, and usages, of the Chickasaw Nation, to Lizzie Stidham, a recognized and enrolled citizen by blood of the Choctaw Nation whose name (as Lizzie Whitner) appears at No. 14508 on a list of citizens by blood of the Choctaw Nation approved by the Department May 20, 1903; that at the date of the marriage both persons were residents in good faith of the Chickasaw Nation; that they lived together continuously as husband and wife in that Nation for about eight months when they separated and were subsequently divorced; and that after the applicant was married to Mollie Smith, a non-citizen white woman with whom he has since resided.

It further appears that on December 2, 1896, the applicant was, by the Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes, admitted as a citizen by intermarriage of the Choctaw Nation and that no appeal was taken from that decision.

It further appears that on March 11, 1897 or 1898, the applicant left the Indian Territory, abandoning his residence in the Choctaw-Chickasaw country, since which time he has resided and become an actual resident of the Territory of Oklahoma.

In view of the record and of Section 21 of the Act of June 28, 1898 (30 Stats., 495), the approval of the Commissioner's decision adverse to the applicant is recommended.
