
MY MISSOURI ALLREDS

Missouri Counties Homes to 3 generations of Allreds

My grandfather, **Fred C. Gilbert**, was the proud guardian of the Gilbert family bible, which documented his paternal line back to 1768. He told us that his mother was an **Allred** from Missouri and the family called his grandfather **Squire**. Imagine my delight when I found **Squire C. Allred** in the 1850 Census for Madison County Missouri! He was 11 years old, living with his parents **Thomas B**. and **Eliza Allred** and 5 siblings. He was born in Tennessee, as were his parents, 2 older siblings, and one younger sibling. The two youngest children were born in Missouri (*App 1*).

Thomas B. Allred is listed in the 1840 census records in Overton TN, District 9. He is between 20 and 30 years old, married, with 3 children under the age of 8 (2 boys and a girl) (*App 2*). This is consistent with the data in the 1850 census in Madison MO.

So...who were Thomas B.'s parents?

The 1830 census for Overton County TN shows that **William, Solomon Jr., John, and Solomon Allred Sr.** are neighbors (*App 3*). **Solomon Sr.** died in 1835 and his will names **Solomon Jr, William B.,** and **John** as his sons (*App 5*). Land transaction records in Overton County TN in 1838 indicate that **John, William B., and Solomon Jr**. are brothers, all sons of **Solomon Sr.**(*App 4*). I have several DNA cousins that have been identified by Ancestry.com among the Tennessee/Missouri Allreds. Four are descendants of **William B.** and his wife **Mary Polly Brown**, and one is a descendent of **Solomon Jr**. There are no official documents that identify **Thomas B.'s** father, but there are several ways that **Thomas B.** is connected to **William B.** I believe that **William B.** is most likely **Thomas B.'s** father, for the following reasons:

- According to the 1830 census in Overton County, **William B.** is the only one of the 3 brothers with a son in the right age range to be **Thomas B.** (*App 3*).
- Thomas B. named his oldest son William (App 1).
- **Thomas B.'s** 1850 census records include a female pauper named **Brown**, 45 years old. If **Mary Polly Brown** was **Thomas's** mother, **Female Brown** may be a relative (*App 1*).
- By 1850 both **William B.** and **Thomas B.** are living in southeastern Missouri (*App 1, App 6*). **Solomon Jr.** was still in TN.

William B. was born in Randolph County NC in 1797. **Mary Polly Brown** was born in NC in 1796. They had 13 children between 1813 and 1837, all born in Tennessee (*Ancestry.com*). As previously noted, his father **Solomon** died in 1835. In 1837 his mother **Sarah** died (*Ancestry.com*) and he began to sell his land. Between 1838 and 1840 **William B**. sold at least 127 acres in Overton County TN (described as being adjacent to **Solomon Allred's** land) to **Thomas Brown** and **William Looper** (*App 7*). According to the 1840 Census, **Thomas Brown** was a neighbor, perhaps related to **Mary Polly** (*App. 3*).

Five of **William B.'s** daughters married into **Boswell, Newberry, Asberry** and **Deese** families. In 1840, according to the Census, **William B.** and all of these families lived in Overton County TN. In the 1850 and later census records, they are all in Missouri or Illinois (*App 8*). **William B.** settled in Reynolds County, in southern Missouri (*App 6*). His oldest

son **Thomas B.** settled in Madison County MO. Entire extended families and their neighbors typically migrated together, and it is likely that these people were all a part of the same wagon train. **Mary Polly** died in 1842 in Reynolds County MO (*Mary Brown Allred*).

Reynolds County was part of the South Courtois Hills, in the Ozark Highlands. The greatest number of settlers in the area came from Tennessee between 1820 and 1860. It would have been similar to Overton County and it is likely that **William B**. knew some of the Tennesseeans already settled there. In fact, one of his neighbors in Overton County, **Gamblin Weeks**, was the sheriff of Reynolds County in 1850. The terrain was hilly, with stream valleys below and gentle inclines with tillable slopes and grazing land above. Slopes provided easy access to water but safety from flooding. Farmsteads were widely dispersed. The culture was based on economic self-sufficiency, as the nearest markets were 40 miles away. Settlers farmed (mostly corn), hunted, and had unrestricted use of unclaimed land to run their livestock (*Clendenen*).

The **1850 Census** (*App 6*) lists **William B.** with five of his youngest children in Reynolds County MO, District 76, as follows:

William B., age 62, farmer, born in NC, real estate \$400 Jonathan, age 27, born in TN Daniel, age 21, born in TN Amanda, age 17, born in TN Nancy, age 13, born in TN Martha J, age 11, born in TN

Four of my Ancestry.com DNA cousins are descendants of **William B.** and **Mary Polly Allred**. All are ranked as 4th-6th cousins (*Ancestry.com*). Only **Amanda Ann** was young enough to be listed with **William B.** in the 1850 Census.

- Mary Ann, b. 1815 in Overton TN, d. 1886 in Overton TN, married Benjamin Norrod.
- Margaret, b. 1817 in Overton TN, died 1887 Jefferson ILL, married Joseph Newberry.
- **Rebecca Ann**, b. 1824 in Overton TN, died 1863 in Johnson AR, **married Joseph** Looper.
- **Amanda Ann,** b. 1832 in Overton TN, married **Nathan Asberry**.

William B. died between 1850 and 1860 and is buried in the Ratliff Cemetery in Reynolds County MO (*Ancestry.com*).

Thomas B. and his family settled in Madison County MO, which is east of Reynolds County, almost to the Illinois border (see map). **Thomas B.'s** wife was **Eliza McClellan** (*Ancestry.com*). They were my 3X great grandparents. They lived in Fredericktown, formerly a French village named St. Michael's (*App 1*). Based on the places and dates of birth of their children we can assume they arrived in Missouri between 1841 and 1846 (see

below). Household members, as listed in the **1850 Census** (*App 1*) in Madison County MO, were:

Thomas B., age 37, born in TN, a farmer (side notation says "County Farm")
Eliza S., age 33, born in TN, a teacher
William M., age 14, born in TN in 1836
Sarah T., age 13, born in TN in 1837
Squire C. (Richard, my 2X great grandfather), age 11, born in TN in 1839 (died in Howell Co MO in 1917)
Eliza A., age 9, born in TN, in 1841 (died in St. Louis MO in 1919)
James M., age 4, born in MO, in 1846 (died in Jefferson Co MO in 1925)
Susan E., age 3/12, born in MO, in 1850
Reba McClellan, age 55, born in TN, a pauper (Eliza's mother?)
Female Brown, age 45, born in GA, a pauper (a relation of Mary Polly, Thomas B.'s mother?)
John Farrin, 37, born in MO, a pauper

The topography of Madison County was different from Reynolds County, all irregular gently rolling hills and valleys (all under 600 feet). The first white men arrived in 1721-23, surveying for minerals. They found lead, zinc, cobalt and nickel. Settlers didn't arrive right away because there was no silver. There were migratory miners in the area between 1725 and 1800. Farmers sold their goods in mining areas. There was also a lumber industry and cattle ranching (*Madison County*). Madison County is noted for mining of lead and quarrying of marble, sandstone, limestone, and granite. However, its principle resources are the agriculture and stock raising enterprises that grew up to support the mining community.

Thomas B. died in 1858 (*Ancestry.com*) and **Eliza** must have remarried right away. The **1860 Census** lists her as **Eliza Matlock**. The children listed with her match the younger ones listed with **Thomas B.** in 1850, plus 8 year old **Nancy Allred** and 3 year old **Catherine Matlock**. **Squire C.**, who would have been about 19 years old, was not a part of the household. There was no husband listed in 1860 and no check under the "Married in 1860" column (*App 9*). Presumably she was already widowed again or divorced. If **Catherine** is her child, **Thomas B.'s** death date is likely incorrect. The alternative is that **Catherine** was **Eliza's** 2nd husband's daughter prior to their marriage.

The **1860 Census** (*App 9*) in Madison Co MO lists the following family members:

Eliza Matlock, age 44, born in TN, farmer, personal estate \$200 Eliza A Allred, age 18, born in TN, domestic James Allred, age 13, born in MO Susan Allred, age 10, born in MO Nancy Allred, age 8, born in MO Catherine Matlock, age 3, born in MO

Eliza Allred Matlock died in 1862 (Ancestry.com).

Richard C. Allred (*aka* **Squire C.)** was my 2X great grandfather. He was born in Overton TN in 1839 and he died in Howell County MO in 1917. He was between 2 and 7 years old when his family made the journey from TN to MO (*App 1*).

Richard C. was about 19 years old when his father **Thomas B.** died in 1858 (*Ancestry.com*). The **1860 Census** shows that he was still living in Madison County MO, with the following family (*App 10*):

Michael McCarron, age 47, born Ireland, a blacksmith, \$1000 real estate, \$3000 personal estate Parmella, age 37, a domestic Margaret, age 10 Nancy, age 5 James, age 3 Michael, age ¹/₂ Richard Allred, age 20, born in MO, \$25 personal estate

His 4 younger siblings were still living with his mother, also in Madison Co MO (*App 9*). His older brother **William M.** and older sister **Sarah T.** were old enough to be on their own by then. I haven't been able to find out anything more about either of them.

Civil War in Missouri

Missouri entered the United States as a slave state under the Missouri Compromise of 1820, which declared that for every slave state to enter the Union a free state must be admitted. It was heavily settled by southerners. During the Civil War it was a border state on the edge of the frontier and a battleground for both sides. There were about 110,000 troops fighting for the Union and about 40,000 fighting for the Confederacy (although many joined Confederate units in other states). The state was part of the "Trans-Mississippi Theater". The Missouri River was strategic in the fight for control over the Mississippi River. To control a river, you have to own both sides of it and control its major tributaries. The Union Army controlled the east bank early in the war. The battle to control the west bank was the focus of the Trans-Mississippi Theater (*The Civil War in the Trans-Mississippi Theater*). Throughout the war, from 1861 to 1865, there were battles and skirmishes on Missouri soil. There were many non-military groups of bushwackers (Confederate sympathizers) and Jayhawkers (Union sympathizers) that harassed the civilian population through acts of guerilla warfare. Local communities were expected to raise forces to combat the vigilantes. The level of violence and brutality in Kansas, Missouri and Arkansas was unmatched anywhere else during the Civil War (*Missouri in the Civil War*).

The major conflict in Madison County was the Battle of Fredericktown (**Richard C.**'s hometown) on October 21, 1861. A Union victory consolidated control of southeastern Missouri. Union officers believed that the locals had supported the Confederacy, so homes

and buildings were burned in retaliation after the battle. (*Engagement at Fredericktown*). Later that year, Company E of the 2nd Missouri Cavalry (Confederate) was formed in Springfield, commanded by **William M. Couzens**. **Richard C.** enlisted as a private on Jan. 28, 1862 (*App 11*). He was 21 years old. In April of 1862 the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Missouri Cavalry regiments were transferred to the east side of the Mississippi River. All were forced to dismount and learn to fight as infantry. The 2nd Missouri Cavalry was the only one remounted during the war. They fought in Mississippi, Tennessee and Alabama (*Short History of the 2nd Missouri Cavalry*).

Richard C.'s Marriage and Family

Richard C. survived the Civil War and married **Mary Caroline Wright** on November 9, 1865 (*App 12*). She was born in 1844 in Madison County MO. **Richard C's** uncle **Jonathan** (**William B.'s** son, from Reynolds County) also ended up in Madison County, where he married **W. M. Wright** (a relative of **Mary Caroline Wright**?) (*Ancestry.com*).

According to the 1870 Census **Richard C.**, **Mary**, and their first child **Viola Virginia** (my great grandmother) were residents of Current River, Ripley County MO (*App 13*).

Richard Allred, age 31, born in TN, farmer, real estate \$300, personal estate \$150 **Mary**, age 26, born in MO **Viola**, age 1, born in MO


Ripley County is southwest of Madison County in the Ozark foothills. It was rugged and sparsely populated. The court house in the county seat at Doniphan burned (along with most of the town) during the Civil War, in 1864. Many record books were removed prior to the burning and survive because they were hidden in a cave south of town for 2 years. During the War the county was strongly pro-Southern. Several skirmishes occurred there. Today it is a tourist area, part of the Mark Twain National Forest (*Ripley County Missouri*).

In 1875 **Richard C.** and his family moved to Howell County MO (*App 14*). The Census records of 1880, 1900 and 1910 all place them there. **Richard C.** engaged in a variety of occupations over the years—druggist in 1880, farmer in 1900, carpenter in 1910 (*App 15*). The census records indicate that they had a total of five children—

Viola, born 1868 in MO William W., born 1872 in MO John F., born 1874 in MO Charley, born 1883 in MO Annie, born 1887 in MO

On January 5, 1892, **Richard C.** claimed 160 acres in Siloam Springs, Howell County, as part of the Homestead Act of 1862 (*App 16*). The law was enacted to facilitate western settlement. It granted adult heads of families 160 acres of surveyed public land for a filing

fee, if they had been living on the land continuously for at least 5 years. He must have settled the land sometime before 1887. Modern plat maps of the area have the same designations as they did in 1892, and we can identify the land that he claimed based on the description on his land patent (*App 18*).

Siloam Springs was a noted health resort in the late 1800s. A mineral water craze spread across the country and people came from miles around to visit. It was named by Dr. Jonathan Brown in 1878 after a healing pool in the Bible (*Howell County Place Names*). Dr. Brown put in a small bath house and showers, then sold the place to D.F. Martin in 1880.

Mr. Martin made considerable improvements and began advertising. His brochure stated that:

- the springs were making themselves a wonderful reputation for their varied healing virtues in chronic diseases of all forms
- thousands of people had visited the resort
- numerous cases could only be described as miraculous cures
- the town had 120 dwellings, several hotels or boarding houses, three general stores, two drug stores, and one livery stable
- homes suitable for small families were available to rent for two or three dollars a month

The town was renamed Martinsville, but Siloam Springs remained the name of the post office. Between 1880 and 1910, the years that **Richard C.** and his family lived there, the

resort prospered and reached a population of 600 residents. Under new ownership in the early 1900s, electric lights and a modern sewer system were installed; the springs were cleaned and walled; parks and playgrounds and a lake for swimming and boating were made; two hotels and cottages were erected. Such was the environment that my great grandmother, **Viola Allred**, grew up in. It declined over the years and the post office closed around 1969 (*Wood*).

On June 11, 1913, at the age of 74, **Richard C.** applied for a Civil War pension. His application stated that he was discharged due to chronic disease, that he was in no important battles, and that he had been recognized by the Daughters of the Confederacy. His pension was initially rejected on the grounds that he was a deserter, which he vehemently denied. He exchanged several letters with officials in the Adjutant General's offices in both Missouri and Washington D.C. He eventually established an accurate record of his service, which paralleled the history of the 2nd Missouri Cavalry (*Short History of the 2nd Missouri Cavalry*). He also had a friend write on his behalf.

At one point he writes:

"Must confess that I am out of patience with this matter. Of course I need the pension or I would not applied for same."

A friend wrote on his behalf:

"I am an old federal soldier, get a pension from the gov. but the war is over with now and I will do anything that is right for an old Confederate. This old man is needy, and worthy."

His pension was granted on August 20, 1913 (*App 17*). The time between his original application and the award date was just over 2 months. This is pretty impressive given that communications involved several people (some in government offices) and were all done by regular mail.

Richard C. died of "la grippe" (malaria or the flu) on Jan 28, 1917 (*App 18*), at the age of 77. Malaria may have been the "chronic disease" mentioned in his Civil War discharge papers that eventually led to his death, or he may have contracted the flu that would eventually be called H1N1 in 1918. The first documented case of H1N1 in the United States was in Haskell Co KS in January of 1918. However, a trend of increasing flu mortality in MO was noted as early as 1915. The 1918 flu pandemic was the deadliest in the 20th century (*Flu Pandemic of 1918*).

His obituary, published in the West Plains Quill on Feb 1,1917, reads as follows:

PIONEER RESIDENT OF SILOAM SPRINGS DIES FEW DAYS AGO **RICHARD C. ALLRED,** 71, a resident of Siloam Springs since 1875, coming from Tennessee was a Confederate soldier during the Civil War. Survived by widow and children, Mrs. Hal Gilbert, Mrs. Clint Wilson, Mrs. Robert House, Will & Charles & John Allred.



He is buried in the Siloam Springs cemetery (Richard C. Allred).

According to the 1920 census, his widow **Mary**, age 75, was living with her youngest daughter **Annie House**, 32 years old, and her 2 year old granddaughter Margie Anne, in Pawnee OK (*App 19*).

By the 1930 census **Mary**, age 86, was living with her youngest son **Charley Allred**, a widower and farmer, in Pawnee OK (*App 20*).

Mary died in 1935, age 90, in Pawnee OK, of asthma/pneumonia (*App 21*). She is buried in Woodland Cemetery in Cleveland, OK (*Mary Caroline Wright Allred*).



Richard C. and Mary's oldest daughter, **Viola Virginia**, my great grandmother, married **William Henry Gilbert** on August 9, 1891 in Siloam Springs (*App 22*). By 1900 they were living in Arkansas and had 5 children. They were to have 7 children in all, one born in a tent in Texas. Most census records found them in a different state, with **William Henry** listing a different profession. In 1900 he was a photographer in Arkansas, in 1910 he was a carpenter in Arizona, in 1920 he was a silver miner in Arizona, in 1930 he was a farmer in New Mexico (*App 23*). My grandfather, **Fred C. Gilbert**, always said that his father spent his life looking for greener pastures. **Fred** married in Texas, then found his way to California, working as a salesman for a chemical company that served the oil fields. He settled down, founded his own company, and raised two daughters, all in the same town where I grew up. The company is still in business and has supported 4 generations of my family. He and my grandmother were the family's first genealogists, followed by my mother and myself.

My Solomon's land was transferred in his will. He said, John, Solomon Jr, and William B "were his sons." John got the property where house and graves were. Also, he mentioned Rebecca Allred (his daughter and John's sister...Solomon Jr and William B's half sister) She was widow to William Stringfellow who died in Barnwell County, S.C. about 1814 before. Once her brother followed his children to Georgia from Barnwell County after 1820, she moved to Overton County, TN where her father, brother, John, and half brothers live. Solomon listed her as Rebecca "Allred" in will and land transfer.

John had moved to Conway, Arkansas (in 1840 census). William B moved about 1841 and in 1850 Reynolds County, Missouri.

When I was in Livingston, there was an older couple who managed the older land records (not at court house or library)and helped me find the land transferred by will of Solomon Sr. I have a copy of it here somewhere. Unfortunately I invited my older brother, from Austin, Texas along on that trip, thinking it could be a bonding experience. He could care less about genealogy and who his ancestors were. He just wanted to go to Nashville. He reminded me of a young 7 year old, expecting me to find entertainment for him while I did my research. He could not understand why I spent so much time on dead people. I told him that those "dead people sacrificed through a lot of hardship so that one day, you could live and that their blood was coursing through your veins." He looked like I had smacked him across his face. However, that lasted for about 30 minutes. :0)

My great great grandfather, Gamblin Weeks was sheriff of Reynolds County in 1850 census. Gamblin had also married a Brown, who died, and he had married a widow who had grown children and were the bullies and county helliuns. Gamblin packed up in 1851-2 (without

his second wife) and moved to Pope County, Arkansas along with his daughter, Sarah Jane (Weeks) Allred and my 3rd great grandfather, Solomon Allred, son of the Solomon Allred Jr. They had moved to Reynolds sometime after the 1850 census of Overton County, Tennessee. You will find both Solomons that I mentioned in the last sentence still in the 1850 census of Overton County, 9th District. [Yes, there was another Solomon Allred in 10th District, Overton County, TN in 1850 sentence. Ignore him.

Research by Jim Allred, from land records in Livingston, Overton TN

Most have accepted the research that Rulon Clark Allred and his many wives and children had guessed and they did a pretty darn good job overall in their book, "The Allred Family in America - Volume I". However, my 4th Great Grandfather, Solomon Sr, being 80-89 years old in 1830 Overton County, Tennessee, who was born between 1741 and 1750 and died there about 1835 was not in their research. My 3rd Great Grandfather, Solomon b 1784 was mentioned but they had him the son of Phineas.

The Solomon that has the most research and has been listed as being born abt 1732-4 (that date was arbitrarily chosen since he owned land in 1852 in Randolph County..20 years old?..but could have been much older), died about 1782 and his estate was inventoried on 26 December 1782. My belief is that Solomon Sr [my 4th Great Grandfather] b. about 1741 and living in Richmond County, NC was the Solomon who benefited from this Richmond County estate settlement rather than the Solomon born about 1770 in Randolph County, NC, who Rulon listed.

I also believe my 4th Great Grandfather, Solomon, to be the father of Phineas & Jonathan (or at least their older brother)

and is living next door or near in 1786 and 1790 census of Richmond County. I now know for sure that he is the father of John (b 1772) (probably by a first wife) AND that he is also the father of Solomon Jr [my 3rd Great Grandfather](b. 1784 my line) and Wm B (b 1787) all born in Richmond Co, NC.

The older children, Phineas & Jonathan (but not John) moved to Barnwell County, SC about 1800, along with their sister, Rebecca, who was second wife to Wm Stringfellow Sr. Wm Stringfellow Sr died there abt 1814 (Jonathan was a will coexecutor with Rebecca). Phineas also died there between 1810-1820, leaving his wife, Bathsheba/Basheba. Jonathan's family have documented that after the 1820 census, Jonathan moved to Georgia where some of his children had moved. He died in Athens, Georgia in April 1822.

There are a lot of Solomons in the 1830 census of TN. The ones in my direct line lived clustered in what was later called the 9th District of Overton. In 1830, Solomon Sr [my 4th Great Grandfather] (b abt 1741), Solomon Jr [my 3rd Great Grandfather] (b abt 1784), William B (b abt 1787), John (b abt 1772), and Rebecca (Allred-b aft 1760) Stringfellow all lived next to each other there in that census.

Also, the other Solomon living in Overton County, Tennesse, but the 10th District, is the Solomon who was born abt 1770 in Randolph Co, NC and the one many researchers have attributed as the Solomon Jr who received a settlement of the Richmond County, Solomon Allred Sr estate inventoried in 1782. If this were the case, he would have only been 12 years old and any estate settlement would have mentioned him as a minor and who was to take care of his share until he reached age 20. I do not recall any one mentioning that. This Solomon (b. abt 1770) was living in his own grouping of children in the 10th District of Overton County, TN in 1830. This Solomon remained in Overton County, TN until his death, leaving his second (or third) wife, Sarah (Swallows) Allred listed with him in the 1850 census. If you look closely at that 1830 census, you will find the two separate groupings of my line and his.

I also now have documented proof via land record transactions that I copied while researching in Livingston, Overton, Tennessee, that specifically names John b 1772, my Solomon Jr [my 3rd Great Grandfather] b 1784, and William B Allred as "sons" of the Solomon [my 4th Great Grandfather] who died there abt 1835.

Another researcher has indicated that he believes that Solomon Sr [my 4th Great Grandfather-b abt 1741] may have been descended directly from the Solomon Alred who appears on the 1724 and 1730 Tax Lists for Chester County, Pennsylvania. I would like to agree with him and say that this Pennsylvania Solomon is probably the one that owned land in 1752 in Randolph County and who died in Richmond County in 1782.
